In General Crowder's classification of leaders for the work-or-fight rule—he includes clerks in shops—which calls to mind that one of the most distinguished soldiers of the war of the rebellion, General Nelson A. Miles, was a clerk in a dry goods store in Massachusetts when the Civil war broke out. When the war ended, he was a major general.

Adjured by the president to "stand by Russia," nothing is being done in a practical sense to help the Russians. We seem to be willing to let the Czech-Slavic army, if such an organization exists, take the field against the Soviets or even against all comers. We seem to be unwilling to let the Japanese army take the field against any foe. Are we standing by Russia, or are we mere bystanders?

Mr. McAdoo has betaken himself to the Pacific coast where "the glorious climate of California," of which we used to hear in that classic play of our boyhood, "The Danites," will exert itself to make him well again. We hope his recovery will be speedy—but this hope is tempered by another, that Mr. McAdoo may be invalided away from his various public jobs long enough so that the country may come to know that he is not indispensable.

"I have lived both in Germany and the United States and I believe that America alone could beat the Germans." Lord Northcliffe thus informs the Petit Parisien, and his flatterer words will be appreciated over here. But we hope that it will never fall to the United States to have to beat the Germans without assistance. Our allies who have thus far kept up the warfare against the Hun are not yet bled white and they will hold the line till we can adequately reinforce them, and then, all together, the allied armies will cross the Rhine. That we shall make the largest contribution to the final campaign of the war is undoubted. That we shall be entitled to the credit of having produced victory will be the verdict of history. But there will be glory enough for all and luckily Lord Northcliffe's belief will not have to be put to the test.

JUDGE MARSTERS LEFT FOR SEATTLE TODAY

Judge R. W. Marsters, one of the Oregon directors of the Pacific Coast Defense League, left today for Seattle, where he will attend a meeting of that organization which will be held July 9 and 10. This meeting has been called to further plans, already under way for the passage of a bill providing for the construction of a military highway on the Pacific coast.

This will be one of the most important highway meetings ever held in the United States, and by far the most important ever held on the Pacific coast. Two other Oregon directors, J. A. Westerlund, of Medford, and Rufus C. Holman, chairman of the board of commissioners of Multnomah county, will be in attendance. L. J. Simpson, president of the Pacific Coast Defense League, will preside over the meeting.

WATCHFAKE COMPANIES THAT WANT YOUR BONDS

Attorney J. O. Watson, chairman of the recent liberty loan drive, today received the following communication from the San Francisco headquarters of the division of loans:

"There has been reported to us very considerable activity by stock salesmen and promoters, principally those representing companies whose securities are utterly worthless, in efforts to exchange the stocks they are issuing for liberty bonds."

"This practice is specifically disapproved by the treasury department and we shall be compelled to characterize any continuance of it as an act unfriendly to the government."

"If any such cases come to your notice, please write to me promptly, giving name of company issuing the stock which is being offered, its address, name of the salesman, and of the officers of the company if you can get them."

"Meanwhile, we hope that you will give wide publicity to this matter, with a view of stopping the practice complained of wherever possible."
