THOSE WITHOUT CHILDREN MUST ENLIST

The United States will draft the army up to 5,000,000 men at the earliest possible date. Men within the proposed new draft ages will register beginning September 5. Members of the district appeal boards in Oregon must prepare to give up all work so that they may devote their entire time to the classification of registrants, if necessary. Men within the new draft ages will be inducted into the national army this fall. These announcements are made by Adjutant General John M. Williams.

The appeal board at Eugene has taken action on the new rule for the classification of married men, announced by the war department, advancing three men, married prior to May, 1917, whose wives before marriage earned their own living and who are now in good health, to class 1. One was a prominent business man in Eugene, another a clerk in the Eugene postoffice and the third a truck driver. Their wives were clerks before marriage.

The new rule affecting married men is the most revolutionary which has so far been received by the draft boards. It goes further than the work or fight rule. A man even though employed in an essential industry, whose wife is without children, in good health and is skilled in some work, is placed in class 1.

The exemption order, as issued through the office of Adjutant General John M. Williams, setting forth the new rule applying to married men follows:

"If a registrant has a wife, but no children, and there are such other sources of support available that the removal of the registrant will not deprive the wife of reasonable, adequate support, he goes in class 1 as not being included in any other division of the schedules."

The district board in its action last week ruled, in making its decision in such cases the sum a wife will receive from her husband's soldier pay will also be taken into consideration.

The exemption circular in interpreting the new rule states:

"Local boards are therefore directed to at once initiate re-classification in the character of cases herein under consideration, and reclassify such registrants in class 1. In so re-classifying other sources of support, including income from property, earnings of the wife at employment in which she is now engaged, or in which she can readily become engaged, plus the allotment and government allowance, should be taken into consideration. The registrants thus re-classified, of course, have the right of appeal, and appeals should be taken by government appeal agents in all cases where local boards do not initiate re-classification and the best interests of the government warrant an appeal."

LARGE NUMBER VETERANS MEET IN PORTLAND

(By Associated Press.) PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 12.—Visitors to attend the national encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic here Aug. 19-23 have already begun to arrive in small parties. Telegraphic reports from railroad points throughout the nation indicate that even larger numbers of veterans are enroute than was at first predicted. Orlando A. Somers, of Kokomo, Ind., is on his way, as is Louise M. Knauff, head of the Woman's Relief Corps, and her staff, from Cleveland, Ohio. Local entertainment and housing committees have practically completed plans for caring for the veterans and members of affiliated organizations.

IMPROVING EASTERN OREGON HIGHWAYS

(By Associated Press.)

PENDLETON, Ore., Aug. 12.—M. O. Bennett, assistant superintendent of construction of state highways, has just returned from an extended trip through Harney, Lake, Grant, Crook and Wheeler counties, where he has been going over questions concerning highway construction with county officials. This week he is touring Wasco county and will proceed from there to Malheur. In Union county he reports work under way on the Elgin-Minam road and the Union-Telocaset road, a total of 16 miles. Further work is planned in Union. The road from John Day to Prairie City, 14 miles, is being graded and macadamized at the request of the government, on account of the development of chrome ore recently found in that district. Twenty tons a day are being sent from John Day mines to Pennsylvania. It is hauled from five to 22 miles on trucks. Baker county has completed plans for several post roads. Morrow county is grading and macadamizing a stretch along the Oregon-Washington highway survey.
