

CHANGING OF TIRES

Do you know that your right rear tire wears faster than the other three. Well, it does. Have you ever stopped to think of the reason for it? The answer is furnished here by the

Since your power and traction come from the rear wheels your rear tires get the hardest wear. You drive on the right side of the road and roads are crowded—your car, nearly always, is slightly tilted— more weight being on that side, therefore your right rear tire takes hold, first and bears more traction than the left rear. When in motion the left rear tire rolls along comfortably on a the smooth middle portion of the road, while the right rear gots the rough going on the off-side—the sharp edgos of the asphalt, the rocks and ruts and is more likely to encounter objects thrown on the side of the road. Then again the rear tire bears the brunt of the stopping, sometimes aliding—a majority of the wear falling on the right rear. The tire receiving the next hardest neage is the left rear, then the right front and last the left front. So when your right rear begins to show signs of wear, and you wish to spare it, put it on the left front wheel. And likewise change your left rear to the right front.


