RIDDLE GROCER IS A HEAVY LOSER IN FIRE

According to a statement of Sheriff George Quine, who returned from Riddle late yesterday evening, where he went to investigate the fire that occurred there Friday morning, the loss of property will probably aggregate \$5,000 to \$10,000. Mr. Davidson, the grocer, is the heaviest loser as he carried no insurance on his stock, which was valued at approximately \$2,000, and was a total loss. The Stuller building, valued at \$3,000, was insured for \$2,000, and there was a small insurance on the Langlois building, occupied by the Davidson grocery. 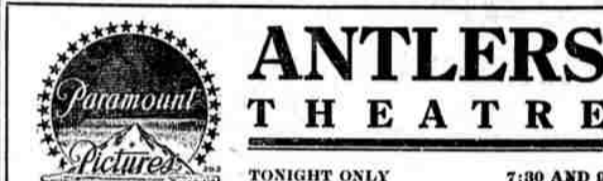
