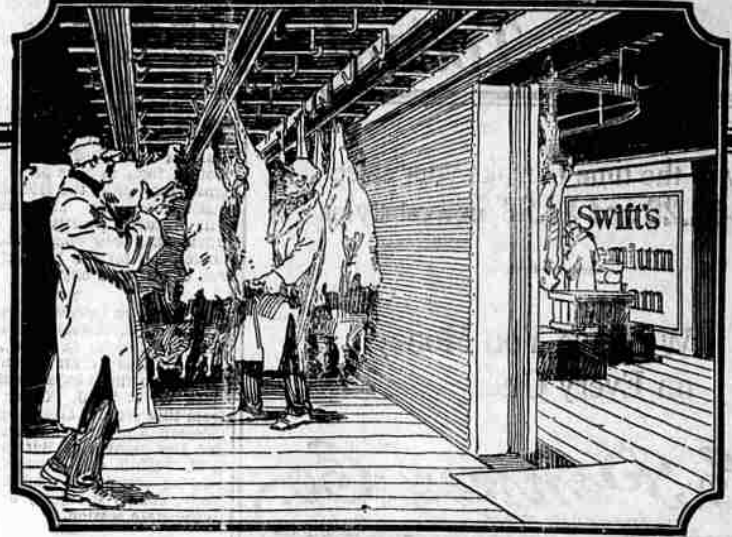

Mr. Lamb was present at a conference held in the Chamber of Commerce yesterday afternoon and received suggestions as to the effect the proposed tax would have on the loganberry juice business.
