Excitedly explaining to Mrs. Jones, that Elwood had been shot, the boys borrowed her auto and transferring the injured lad to the machine hastily took him home. Dr. Miller was called and found that the shot, a 22, had entered the calf of the leg, passed back of the bone and out, leaving a flesh wound that will detain the youngster at home for a few days. It appears that Gilbert Wood was handling the "artillery" at the time of the accident. Both families are happy that the affair is no worse, and trust the incident may

Ten Mile School Closed. Acting under orders from Dr. K. L. Miller, county health officer, the Ten Mile school has been closed for a week, at least, awaiting developments from exposure to Spanish influenza. It appears that Paul Martin, one of the young soldiers who were recently stricken with the malady while visiting here, exposed many people in the Ten Mile district, and such alarm was felt there, so the school will be closed until the time of incubation has passed, and if no cases result the session will continue again next week.
