LAST MESSAGE FROM LIEUT. LESLIE TOOZE

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 19.—We leave for France soon, I expect to return. But if I fall, you will know that my life has been purchased at the highest price it ever could command, for the greatest cause history has ever known, the great cause of human liberty in the world.

These words were received by Walter L. Tooze, Sr., from Lieutenant Leslie Orland Tooze, his son, who was shot by a German sniper somewhere in the St. Mihiel salient in France, September 28. News of his death was contained in the cablegram from Leslie's twin brother, Lamar, who is also in France.

On February 4, 23 years ago the Tooze twins were born at Woodburn, this state, and had been practically inseparable until the link which bound them was severed by the shot from the gun of the German sniper.

For several years they lived at Falls City, where they graduated from the High School. There they first gained more than a local reputation on debating teams throughout the Willamette Valley. When they entered the University of Oregon they were well known to many of the students there and their activities in the student-body took a wide range.

Leslie was a member of the Beta Theta Pi fraternity of the Fraternity Club and an honorary member of the National Chamber of Commerce.

The twins were graduated from the University in 1916, and in 1917 entered the Harvard Law School, where Leslie won the Beals prize for the best first-year law brief.

When war was declared both entered service, Leslie going to the training camp at Presidio and Lamar to Plattsburg, N. Y. Each was awarded a commission as Second Lieutenant. At Camp Lewis both were promoted to the rank of First Lieutenant and they sailed for France late in June.

Leslie in a letter which reached his father a few days ago, said he had just completed inspection of 2500 German prisoners. The young officer met death "with conspicuous gallantry" said the cablegram bearing news of his death.

A third brother, Walter L. Tooze, Jr., had command of the training camp at the Oregon Agricultural College until transferred recently to command of the camp of a large school in Iowa. The mother lives in Eugene.
