### LETTERS ARE DELAYED BY FAULTY ADDRESS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—The mail service for our army abroad has now been taken over by the army. It is handling 1,000,000 letters a day that are received in France from this country and about 300,000 letters a day that are mailed in France for soldiers in France. It has warehouses for sorting mail at French ports. It has railway mail clerks on some 2,000 miles of French railroads. It has a central post office at Tours, permanent post offices at various points, mobile post offices right up to the firing lines, and mail orderlies attached to each company of troops.

In the past, when the mail service for the army was under civil control, great delays were caused in the delivery of mail by the necessary secrecy concerning troop movements. Now, under military control, all movements of the mobile post offices are telegraphed in code to the distributing post offices and the letters follow the soldiers as they march.

It still remains true that mail for some 50,000 soldiers in France is delayed because the letters are inadequately addressed. In the future all such letters will be stopped at New York and returned to their senders. It is estimated that 300,000 letters a month have been delayed in the past because of the faulty addresses.

## Y. M. C. A. RECRUITING COMMITTEE IS NAMED

Tuesday night Mr. F. E. Sickle, representing the recruiting department of the Y. M. C. A. and W. E. Wright, General Secretary for the Interstate Y. M. C. A., both of Portland, were in the city arranging for a local committee to receive applications for Y. M. C. A. secretaries and other workers.

A committee consisting of F. H. Churchill, chairman, Dr. S. L. De Lapp, secretary, B. L. Eddy, B. W. Strong and O. P. Coshaw, were appointed for receiving applications and assisting in recruiting for Y. M. C. A. duty both at home and overseas.

There is quite a range of employment in the Y. M. C. A. work overseas. Automobile drivers and repairers, accountants, clerks and teachers are very much in demand. General Pershing said on one occasion, give him a regiment of 900 men and one competent Y. M. C. A. secretary and he had a force equal to 1,000 men.

Men of duty overseas must be over 37 years of age and not over 50 years; for duty in the cantonments and lumber camps at home, men over 35 years and as old as 60 years will be received. Every man appointed to work overseas must be approved by the war department of the government as well as by the officers of the Y. M. C. A.
