BRAZEN AFFRONT.

The following, taken from the Portland Telegram is a good sample of the brazen affront displayed by many publications who are served by the United Press service:

Defending the most notorious fake in the history of journalism, the Portland Journal tries to drag in The Telegram by charging that The Telegram is quite as unreliable as the Journal. On that point, let the people of the Pacific Northwest be the judge.

But in the present case The Telegram is not on trial. The Journal was indicted at the bar of public opinion for unparalleled mendacity, and found guilty. So was the United Press.

Briefly summarized, the case against the Journal and the United Press disclosed the facts: The press association sent out a report which was 100 per cent lie. We have the unsupported word of the correspondent that he learned from Admiral Wilson at Brest that an armistice had been signed, but it is absolutely unbelievable that Admiral Wilson fixed the hour of the signature, or that he stated that hostilities ceased three hours later. This cabined report was an unmitigated untruth.

No right-minded person censures the Journal for publishing the original dispatch. It came in the regular way and had the earmark of genuineness. But within an hour the Journal knew that the report had been discredited by every other news agency. Within two hours it had been officially discredited by London, Paris and Washington. Yet in its regular editions the Journal repeated the lie, amplified by manufactured corroborative detail. It continued the bluff at least eight hours after every respectable newspaper in the United States had announced authoritatively that the armistice had not been signed.

The Journal was not responsible for the original fake, but public opinion has condemned it for persistently circulating a bald-faced lie several hours after it knew to a certainty that it contained not one grain of truth. An honorable newspaper would have felt the duty of circulating a retraction at the earliest possible moment; if not a retraction, at least a doubt.

There can be and is no defense for the Journal. It stands convicted in the Pacific Northwest as the conscienceless purveyor of untruth.

The patrons of the United Press service having been deliberately inveigled into spreading broadcast the most deniable lie ever fostered on an intelligent public are now trying to "apply the solve" to the wound. The U. P. "exclusive" peace propaganda was a regular pro-German utterance, and the least said about the matter by the supporters of the rank impostor and falsehood the better for all concerned—especially the publications who use that grapevine service.

Don't imagine that because an armistice has been signed that it releases you from all obligations to subscribe to future war funds. The present drive is just as important, in fact, more so, than before the armistice was signed. We must keep boys over there well supplied until peace has been proclaimed by President Wilson—and then some.

It was The News, through the old reliable Associated Press, that first informed the citizens of Roseburg and vicinity that the armistice had been signed. The News was responsible for the general alarm given and when it became known the report was not from the "fake" press service the "big thing" started and the celebration was a hummer.

After The Evening News announced the armistice had been signed our contemporary threw its hat in the air and yelled like a coyote. It's a wise guy that knows when to open the cavity in his face—but the Associated Press reports make 'em all sit up and take notice.

The alleged fact that our contemporary had a bulletin posted before the fire whistle blew, stating the armistice had been signed, is not evidence that anybody knew of the occurrence, other than himself, and if they did probably thought it a fake.

We might throw a rope around the Kaiser's neck and exhibit him to the world as the greatest beast of ancient or modern times. Then, as a final disposition, place him in one of Uncle Sam's monster guns and shoot him across "No Man's Land."

Hereafter United Press paper will become negotiable as soon as properly indorsed by the Associated Press, and not before.—Portland Telegram.

DON'T BE AFRAID TO DRINK SKIM MILK

CORVALLIS, Nov. 11.—Skim milk contains not only the right proteins but everything else including mineral matters needed for the growth of the young.

"Don't be afraid of skim milk just because it has a low commercial value," says D. V. Chappell, assistant professor of dairying at the Oregon Agricultural College. "Everyone knows that whole milk is an indispensable food for the young. It is comparatively economical in the diet of the adult. The only nutrient taken from it in skimming is the butterfat."

"All of the sugar, which is approximately five per cent of the total matter, and all of the protein remain after skimming. As a tissue builder skim milk is the equivalent of whole milk, but not as an energy and heat producer. The tissue building materials are usually contained in the more expensive foods, such as eggs and meat, while the heat yielding materials are largely found in the cheaper foods, such as bread and potatoes."

"Recent experiments show that skim milk contains an unknown substance (vitamines) absolutely essential to the normal growth and development of the young. This substance is found in but few other foods. A really successful substitute for milk or skim milk has not yet been found."
