**THE DOWNFALL OF KINGS.**

"God said, I am tired of kings, I suffer them no more; Up to my ear the morning brings, The outrage of the poor."  
 "Think ye I made this ball A field of havoc and war, Where tyrants great and tyrants small Might harry the weak and poor? "My angel—his name is freedom,— Choose him to be your king; He shall cut pathways east and west And fend you with his wings."  
 How well these words of Ralph Waldo Emerson's apply to this present moment! Only four short months ago, and the power of the tyrants appeared as unassailable as the Alps. There they sat in dreadful security, protected by millions of submissive and ferocious slaves, armed with weapons of destruction against virtue, truth and innocence. Thence they sent their armies, crushing, burning, ravaging, leaving behind a trail of ashes, death, and woe.

And then came the old result that has always happened when the powers of earth defied the laws of God and man. The image had feet of clay. The throne was built upon stubble. Nothing lasts unless built on honor and justice.

So today the infamous Wilhelm of Hohenzollern and his despicable son, once the proud and mighty rulers, are now outcasts, subject of the world's disgrace and loathing.

**BREAKING UP CAMP.**

The following telegram was received this afternoon by E. G. Morris, chairman of the local canteen, from G. W. B. Pursell, division director of the canteen service at Seattle, says the Grants Pass Courier.  
 "The demobilization of soldiers from Camp Lewis begins this Tuesday, November 19, at the rate of 500 men per day, and will continue to completion. Please have the canteen workers at all trains. Do not await notice of train arrivals from the railway men. All troops in transit have ample money, and none should be allowed them."

**CHOP FARE FOR SOLDIERS.**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Director General McAdoo today announced his intention of establishing a reduced passenger rate of 2 cents a mile, instead of the usual 3 cents, for soldiers returning to their homes after discharge from the Army.  
 By law the soldiers are allowed

3½ cents a mile for transportation and meals, and the special fare will enable them, Mr. McAdoo believes, to buy meals and pay for sleeping car reservations out of the allowance.
