A LEAGUE OF PEACE.

Some of our Statesmen feel that
the proposed League to Enforce
Peace, or any league of nations,
would bind us too closely, and that
our voice in such a league might
not count more than that of some
insignificant nation. They feel that
we would be outvoted by the Euro-
pean members of the league, whose
interests would not accord with ours.
If our Monroe doctrine, they say,
which we always regarded essential
to our safety, should be challenged,
we would have to abandon it, should
a majority of the league decline to
sanction it. Unless we take steps to
prevent war, we must carry an enor-
mous military and naval establish-
ment, with tremendous costs for mu-
nitions and munition plants. Another
war like this, and the world would be
reduced to absolute ruin. The very
least that should be done is to form
an international council to meet every
year to adjust relations between na-
tions and maintain harmony. There
is much less likelihood of future
wars if the representatives of the
powers are working together in an
international body. Whether it is
wise to give such a body the power
to declare war against a refractory
member of the council, without re-
ferring the matter to the govern-
ments represented, is a question that
time would have to work out. It
is not probable that our government
would consent to grant such power
at the first. Such a council ought
to be able to enforce its decisions
without war by the threat of econ-
omic boycott. When a quarrelsome
nation realizes that it will be cut off
from foreign intercourse unless it
behaves, it will think a long time be-
fore putting an army in the field. If
we fall now to create the machinery
that shall stop further wars, 10,000-
000 lives have been sacrificed in vain,
and their blood will cry out on re-
proach.

GERMAN OPINION OF AMERICAN.

While many of our readers may
be familiar with the intercepted let-
ter from Albert Ballin, formerly the
head of the Hamburg-American Line,
to Walter Rathenau, we believe that
it will prove of special interest at
this time. It was written in Decem-
ber, 1917.

"Our people have little or no know-
ledge of American character. You
and I have made a most careful study
of it. What stuff our publicists and
journalists write about their Ameri-
can worship, their greed, their envy
of other nations, their lack of dis-
cipline! You and I know that the Ameri-
cans are probably the most idealistic
nation on the earth's surface. We
know that they would not have en-
tered the lists of our foes had they
had any doubt as to the justice of
their cause. Nonsense as they say
have been influenced by Britain. We
are mad not to see where we are
driving. In antagonizing the United
States we have done a disastrous
thing, a thing which will throw its
cold shadow on our economic life for
a generation."

The administration is charged by
Japan with violating agreements with
regard to the Russian situation. Sen-
ator Johnson, of California, has intro-
duced a measure asking for the "in-
side workings" of the state depart-
ment as to the matter. It would ap-
pear that the great American public
is ignored in this affair, like in most
others, when wide publicity should
have been given all these plans. The
people who supply the blood and
money for carrying on the war ought
to be worthy of confidence. It is
hoped Senator Johnson's probe will
get to the bottom of facts and reveal
a lot of things the people are anxious
to know about.

Speaking of Hun propaganda, how
do you feel since the senate investi-
gating committee has shown up
Hearst officially as being an ally of
Germany? asks the Corvallis Gazette.
How would you like to have had
your name read out as one of the men
"who are on our side (Germany's)"
as was the name of David Starr Jordan?
How would you like to be in
the shoes of Roger Sullivan of Chi-
cago and a "prominent woman of
Detroit"? Mr. Ford no doubt, who
were said to be doing everything in
their power to injure the allied
cause? Considering the frequent re-
velations concerning the machina-
tions of Mr. Hearst, do you feel en-
tirely patriotic when you read one of
Hearst's papers or magazines or pa-
per using his press service? Aside
from the Portland Journal, which
uses the Hearst news service, the
Hearst papers do not circulate here.
The Hearst magazines are The Cos-
mopolitan, Good Housekeeping, Har-
per's Bazaar, Motor, Motor Boating,
and Hearst's.

In addition to cancelling con-
tracts for further munitions, Sec-
retary Baker would do well to stop the
erection of additional factories for
the making of those munitions. The
people longing plant in New Jer-
sey was wiped out by an explosion a
short time ago. Work is now being
rushed and hundreds of thousands of
dollars are being spent to replace the
buildings destroyed at that time.
The country would like to see such
wastes come to a halt.

It is announced by the War De-
partment that wounded and sick sol-
diers returning from France will be
placed in hospitals in this country
as near to their former homes as pos-
sible. In no case will the distance be
greater than 300 miles. This action
is in line with suggestions made by
Republicans of the House months
ago. A measure of Republican au-
thority is now pending in that body
designed to accomplish that very ob-
ject.

With horrors of Armenian mas-
sacres and revolting atrocities of
every conceivable sort perpetrated
upon Christian women and girls by
Turkish soldiers, the world will most
eagerly await action by the peace
conference.

The Hun and the Turk are in the
same class. Is there any delegate to
the peace conference who will discuss
terms with either.
