DROOLING SENTIMENTALITY.

As an offset to the sickening sympathy, which some people are wasting upon the supposedly hungry Huns, the Berkeley, California, Gazette has begun the publication of a series of articles under the heading "Last We Forget." These articles will relate well authenticated instances of German barbarities, perpetrated by German soldiers or German civilians with or without the authority of the German government. And instances are not lacking. From the day when the Kaiser denounced his treaty with Belgium as a mere scrap of paper and proceeded to devastate that offensive country, down to the day of the signing of the armistice, the Germans were as ruthless as they were powerful. Their atrocities were limited only by their opportunities. None of the rules of civilized warfare was binding upon the Hun. No instinct of humanity prompted an act of mercy. Not even the helpless prisoner was immune from the brutality of the sons of Attila. Having heaped upon their foes every injury, indignity and insult which a savage mind could devise, the Huns deprived them of even the satisfaction of vengeance by seeking an armistice as soon as defeat was certain, and surrendering their fleet without firing a shot. The slightest sympathy bestowed upon such a people is absolutely wasteful. The slightest aid advanced to them is worse than wasted. They are as incapable of appreciation and gratitude as they were wanting in either sense of honor or feeling of mercy. Newspapers that publish the facts regarding the German record "Last We Forget" are serving well their constituencies.

Some democratic ideas of efficiency remind one of the mechanical cartoons depicting methods of attaining simple ends. It appears that argon, an inert, non-inflammable gas, will be used in the future for the inflation of balloons in order to eliminate the fire hazard. Natural gas containing one per cent of argon has been discovered at a point in Texas. It is proposed to build a pipe line over 94 miles in length from the gas well to another point, and there erect an extracting plant, where the argon will be separated, placed in cylinders and shipped to balloon fields for use. To extract one per cent of argon 99 per cent of hydrogen is to be transported through a pipe line, costing \$1,050,000 to construct. In order to reach a plant yet to be built at a cost of \$900,000. To the layman the obvious procedure would be, to erect the plant in the immediate vicinity of the gas well, thereby saving time and large construction and maintenance costs.

The proposal of United States peace envoys to destroy the surrendered vessels of the German fleet does not sound good. The value of the captured battle ships and cruisers is a staggering figure, and it would be little short of criminal to take the course suggested. Senator Lodge has very properly introduced a resolution asking the state department to clear up the mystery of whence authority for this proposal came from.
