MANY KILLED WHEN MEXICAN REBELS RAID

VERA CRUZ, MEXICO, Dec. 7.—More than one hundred deaths, according to unofficial estimates, resulted from the latest attack by rebels on a Mexican Railway passenger train from the capital to Vera Cruz. The rebels wrecked the exploring train, which was following, was derailed soon enough to back out of danger to Garmanon, near which station the attack was staged.

Reinforcements drove away the rebels, but only after thirty federal soldiers, eight women camp followers and other unidentified persons had been killed. Seventy rebels are said to have fallen.

The same day a band of outlaws under Marcello Caraveo attacked Jalapa, former capital of the state of Vera Cruz, but were driven off. Before attacking Jalapa the rebels robbed a train enroute to that city.

CHRISTIANIA, Dec. 7.—To strengthen the business relations between Norway and the United States, a movement has been set on foot here for an exhibition of Norwegian and American mercantile products to be held in Norway during the autumn of 1919. It is being backed by a large number of corporations having business relations with America.

SAN FRANCISCO, CAL., Dec. 7.—Trial of the so-called Sacramento neutrality cases which began here today, involved two officials of the Imperial German consulate-general in San Francisco, a dozen other individuals and three corporations under indictments returned in 1916 and 1917.

A blanket indictment returned July 7, 1917, charged conspiracy to violate the neutrality of the United States in 1914 and 1915 through an attempt to make San Francisco a base of supply for a German fleet, then operating in the South Pacific ocean, and conspiracy to obtain false clearance for various ships needed to carry out the plan. The case centered about the steamship Sacramento, which was alleged to have delivered a general cargo to the German fleet after it was "captured" off the coast of Chile; the steamship Maratona, which was alleged to have delivered coal to the German cruiser Leipzig at Guaymas, Mexico; the steamship Olson and Mahoney, which was denied clearance papers here, and the steamships Maverick and Annie Larson, which were alleged to have been used in an attempt to send arms and ammunition to revolutionists in India.
