QUELLING THE "FLU"

The influenza epidemic dies hard. In nearly every part of the United States it still lingers. It appears to move in a series of waves rather than as one great tidal wave of sickness. In many communities, as in Boston for example, it breaks out violently again just as the public expected its disappearance.

Physicians say that the disease does not make its victims immune thereafter, as many contagions do. The cured sufferer may catch it again in a few weeks, like an ordinary cold. Communities as a whole are able to infect themselves over and over again. This very thing is being done right along in cities and towns that do not adopt strict rules and maintain them until the ailment is most thoroughly stamped out.

It should be recognized everywhere, by private citizens and public officials alike, that relaxation of the oft-repeated rules is perilous. As long as there are any cases left in the community, the familiar precautions should be continued.

"Walking cases"—patients who have the ailment in a mild form or in its first stages—should by all means stay at home and avoid infecting others. Every person suspecting that he or any member of his family has contracted the disease should promptly call a doctor and follow that doctor's instructions. Well persons should avoid crowds as much as possible, particularly in closed places. Public gatherings should be postponed whenever possible. Where people are obliged to assemble, windows should be open to insure thorough ventilation. All persons coughing or sneezing should be more than usually careful to cover up their coughs and sneezes. Other persons should dodge when they see anyone thus spraying germs into the air.

Only by such procedure can the epidemic be really wiped out.

When little children return to their home after a day at school and confide to their parents that they "just love their school teacher" there is no further need of worry on the part of the home folks as to the ultimate results of the school term, so far as their own children are concerned. "Cramming" a young head full of knowledge in a mechanical way is like trying to insert a square peg in a round hole. A teacher who commands the love and respect of her scholars is an ideal tutor—those who cannot take advantage of this asset are working at a great disadvantage, not only to themselves, but to the pupil.

Some democratic newspapers whose plots are so narrow between the eyes they can't see over the bridge of their nose, are trying to discredit the late Theodore Roosevelt—the greatest American of recent history—and are speaking harshly of his attitude toward the Wilson administration. It is only to be regretted that the nation has not more men of the Roosevelt type to knock some of the planks out of the democratic political war program, but what he has said and done, will live as long in history—probably longer—than the alleged patriotic acts of a number of other distinguished citizens, who have been in the public lime light during the period of the war.

Beware the mining stock salesman who is letting you in on the deal so as to put one over on Wall street, and the politician who loves the people so much better than anyone else does that the only way to make him feel right about it is to have him on the payroll. Did you hearily of any of these people, lovers to begin the expression of his affection by lopping off salaries?

It used to be argued that a politician could run a business with better results for the people than a business man could, but since the thing has been tried on, and the result has been higher cost and poorer service, the people are not sure about this.

Well, mother dear, have the table set when I get there, for I haven't had a good meal since I left. Wishing you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year, MURREL.
