PARIS, Feb. 6.—The supreme war council of the world peace conference met at Versailles today for the purpose of imposing on Germany the "full will of wills," says The Matin. This appears necessary because of Germany's unwillingness to carry out the armistice terms except under certain conditions. The Matin alleges that there has been a decided change in the attitude manifested by Germany, whose arrogance toward the contents of late has been manifested openly.
