A NEW "ANGEL" IS BORN.

Having utterly failed in their attempt to pass House Bill No. 120, the big fishing interests have now carefully laid their plans to choke the very life out of the upper Umpqua river fishermen by the introduction in the senate, of a bill that provides that all matters pertaining to the fishing industry of the state be placed in the hands of the Fish and Game Commission, which, by the way, consists of only five men, appointed by the governor, who will, if the present bill goes through, have complete authority—above any and all comers the governor not excepted, to put into execution and regulation, no matter how obnoxious to the public, any law that they may deem fit "for the preservation of the fish and game of the state of Oregon."

STILL IN THE DARK.

As the days and weeks fleet by, news from the inner recesses of the peace congress in France is still lacking, despite the very first of Mr. Wilson's "fourteen points," which says that peace covenants shall be open and openly arrived at. The alleged secret treaties between Japan and China, which are rumored to be threatening the peace of the peace conference, could scarcely be more secret than the councils of world delegates, among whom are President Wilson and four other Americans. Why does not the president make good his solemn pledge to America and the world for "open covenants of peace openly arrived at?"

The democratic administration is a complete failure—both in and out of war. No sooner do the soldiers throw off the yoke of the battle front when they are confronted with after war conditions that are more destructive than German lead and gas. While the head of the nation is being wine and dined and toted about Europe, thousands of soldiers at the front are "up to their ears" in the slimy mud, washing their faces in filthy water and subjected to open avenues of all sorts of diseases. This is a pretty state of affairs for the nation to sanction. Better look after our own blood and flesh before contributing millions of dollars to the Bolsheviki element in foreign lands to "fatten them up" so they can attempt to run affairs in America.

Senate bill 216, giving a commission of five men authority to close or open the season for commercial fishing in Oregon streams, was introduced by a man identified with several big corporations, among them fisheries. The whole thing is pernicious, and smacks of a deliberate attempt to put Oregon's fishing industry in the hands of commercialized organizations. Concentration of power is a bad thing for any people, and to allow a party of five men to deal out the fish to whom they would, is but to invite possibilities of some of them going on the pay roll of the big interests. Kill that measure at once, and leave the fishing business in the hands of the people.

The Seattle "sympathetic" strike is almost ancient history and the Bolsheviki element had hardly got within the ring before the punch of public sentiment floored the rascals. Mayor Ole Hanson called the bluff—and had the right kind of mettle to "stand pat."
