Lee Conlee and Miss Crystal Warnock, yesterday paid fines of \$1 into the treasury of the city, for leaving their cars standing on side streets without lights.

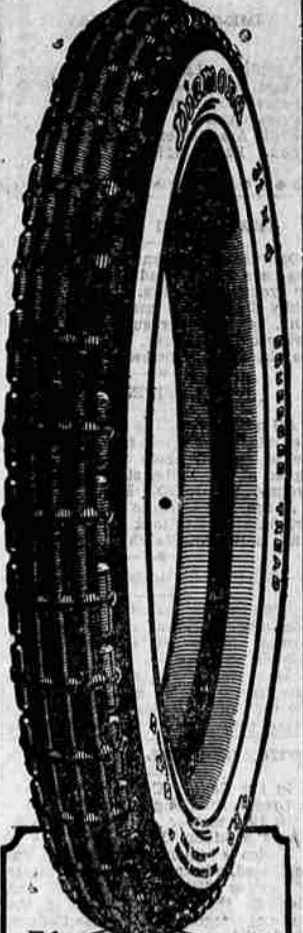
Returns to Riddle.
