AFTER THE ANARCHIST.

Anarchy is raising its ugly head and it is time to face it and put it down. Police forces everywhere should give their first attention to discovering the men who recently sent bombs through the mails at New York and elsewhere, as well as the authors of many other like crimes. People observing suspicious circumstances should report them. A persistent search for these miscreants should lead someone to squeal. Such acts are the deeds of dirty cowards. To clamor for more rights for the people, and at the same time attempt to destroy the men whom the people have chosen to represent them, indicates a mind poisoned to its very depths. The close resemblance in chemical composition shown between these bombs, and those used on German floating mines, is a startling point from which to work. A likely theory would be that the German spies had a considerable quantity of chemicals stored in this country, which they used on the many explosions occurring during the war. Now they are perhaps venting their spite by using some of this material in acts of terrorism. If so they are showing very slight intelligence. The effect of such outrages will be to promote sentiment for getting rid of undesirable aliens, and for stifling immigration more closely. It will make the people determined to rid themselves of elements that spend their whole time trying to wreak mischief.

According to the representative of the Labor party, these bombs are probably a "phant" set by the "hirelings" of the capitalists, to discredit the radical elements. But the ordinary citizen will not take stock in such far fetched theories. He will attribute the thing to the same gang that burned wheat and storehouses, freight cars, and munition plants. The tracks of anarchism, radicalism, and pro-Germanism are indicated.

The thirty-nine republican Senators who signed the original round robin denouncing the first constitution of the league of nations, are being heard from in reference to the revised version. Thus far no signs of wavering from their first stand are apparent; rather has their opposition been intensified. One Washington correspondent who keeps in close touch with Senatorial opinion, reports that "there is much more hostile opinion found against the new draft than at first appeared against the original, and all signs point to a battle between the defenders of America's freedom and the advocates of the new international creed when ratification by the Senate is asked for."
