GRIFFITH TO FILM GREAT CELEBRATION

The master magician of the motion picture has been won to the Centenary. D. W. Griffiths, producer of "The Birth of a Nation" and "Hearts of the World", will film the celebration of one hundred years of Methodist missions at Columbus next July.

Word of the Centenary Victory has been brought to the joint Centenary Committee's headquarters in New York by the members of the Centenary team of leaders just returned from their transcontinental tour.

Thousands of feet of film, recording the spectacle of the Columbus celebration, have been pledged to the Centenary without cost by the famous producer. He gives them as a memorial to his mother, who was a Methodist.

DANCING HORSES IN CIRCUS.

The A. G. Barnes big four-ring wild animal circus, which is to give two performances here May 16, is well known in this vicinity and has always given us a clean wholesome entertainment of excellent animal exhibits.

This season the show has been entirely gone over, every wagon, railroad car, etc., having had from four to seven coats of paint and two coats of varnish, the entire equipment has been overhauled and put in the pink of condition, new wardrobe for the entire aggregation and many new animals.

There are several new numbers on the bill this year and not least among them is a madcap dancing act in which forty horses and forty girls take part. The Barnes paddock has been his pride, his high school horses in tango and two-step dancing features have received high praise, but never before have so many horses been assembled in one act as in this season's offering. Many intricate dancing steps have been taught the horses, and charming girls who trip the light fantastic will be the mounts. After taking their steeds through their steps they will dismount, the horses striking a picturesque position while the girls do their turn. A forty-piece marine band will play for them, which is a feature in itself.

The show is coming to Roseburg from Grants Pass and will arrive early showday morning. There will be an all-day open den street parade at 10:30 a. m. Doors to the main show will open at 1 and 7, allowing the patrons an hour to visit the animal actors and listen to a free concert by the band.
