THE NEW CONGRESS.

The Congress held just before the choice of a president has not usually been very constructive. There is too much desire to make political capital. The time would be very largely taken up by speeches, which the members were anxious to have franked to their constituents. Politicians are afraid of getting caught on the wrong side and offending some aggressive body of voters. So they have had a way of dodging many questions, and postponing and pigeonholing them. This was particularly true of the period from about 1880 to 1900, when the politicians spent their time in debating old and threadbare issues. They set up men of straw and knocked them down again with great gusto. It was a period of contention over superficial issues. A great deal of energy had to be devoted to combating eccentric crazes that swept over the country from time to time. Few great constructive acts were passed. Most of the economic problems of the 19th century went over to the 20th unsolved. The last dozen years have shown a new spirit in politics. It is a time of unsettlement and change. The people are not satisfied with the old ways and the living conditions of the past. They demand efficiency, business methods, social justice, constructive work. They are sick of the old, sterile political tactics and would rather see some mistakes made than to have nothing done. The lesson of all this for Congress is that partisan feeling must be relegated to the background. Each party must form its constructive projects of legislation to meet existing conditions. No party can get anywhere on a basis of mere criticism. It can win favor only on a basis of things done, of new social institutions created, of old systems of government and business placed on a new footing to meet these changing times.

ECONOMICAL USE OF MEATS.

The big meat packers are announcing that they are going to start an advertising campaign to teach the public how to use meats economically. If there is not much demand for a particular cut of meat which has good food value, it is proposed to educate the public up to using it. This is such a sensible idea, that it is a wonder it was never tried before. When meat began to advance some years ago, the government and authorities on household economy began to urge the people to use the cheaper cuts. The newspapers printed a great deal of stuff showing how these less expensive meats could be made appetizing. But many people complained that when they went to their markets, they could not find these cheaper cuts on sale. Apparently a good many provision dealers, not finding much demand for them, would take no pains to have them in stock. Since meat has been so very high, people have had to consider its cost more carefully. The use of the cheaper cuts has been popularized to a large extent. Still there are many people of quite small incomes, who persist in having the most expensive portions. They can't seem to realize that the skilled cook can make the other sections very palatable. The meat packing interests have much to gain by popularizing information of this character. There is a great deal of bitter feeling toward the packing interest. Many believe they have made too much money out of the exigencies of the people. If they can do anything to promote a more economical use of meat, it must tend to relieve the pressure of prices, and in that way to create a more favorable sentiment toward the packing interest. It always pays for the sellers of any article to show the consumers how to use it to the best advantage.

Laying aside all ostentation and high-sounding idealism, the plain fact is that the United States went into this war because it had been repeatedly attacked by Germany. We went in to help whip the Hun and teach them a lesson they will long remember. They have not been and probably will not be punished as they should be, but as far as is now practicable, the purpose of the war has been attained. The one important thing now is to attain peace. Whether there shall also be a league of nations is entirely another matter and should be taken up later on its own merits.
