GETTING READY FOR AIRPLANES

Feeling that airplanes will soon be a feature of daily life, many people believe that communities should begin to get ready for them, and that legislatures should pass laws regulating their use. For one thing they would have towns set aside fields for their use. It is about 20 years since automobiles were first seen. Many people believe that 20 years from now airplanes will be as much of a factor in daily life. While it may be so, this does not seem rather visionary. Air flight is accomplished against great and perilous obstacles, beside which the difficulties that confronted automobiles were trifling. In case of a break in an automobile, nothing happens except a disagreeable repair job. In case of a break in the airplane, everything happens. But for all that, it seems a fair guess that five years from today airplanes will be a common sight everywhere, and most towns will have at least a few, operated by the type of men willing to take some risks for sport or business. They will never need much regulation. The ways of heaven are wide and there will be few collisions. Novices should not be permitted to fly over the centers of towns and cities. If there is danger of heavy articles dropping from a plane, it must be guarded against. Pilots ought to be required to take certain courses of instruction from competent teachers, before permitted to fly at will. Passenger carrying planes will have to be very carefully regulated, so that no incompetent pilot is allowed to solicit patronage. Apart from a few such matters, the planes will be as free of the law as the birds. While the matter is not one calling for immediate attention, it is a fascinating subject of speculation, and opens up broad vistas of coming achievement.

The indications are that the present month will mark the complete overthrow of the British-Wilsonian league of nations in the popular mind. As the weeks have passed since the first publication of the proposed covenant, support from the people has steadily diminished just in proportion as they were supplied with information enabling them to form unprejudiced opinions of the effort of the league on our national life. The propaganda for the league, engineered from the headquarters of the League to Enforce Peace, of which Mr. Taft is the head, has reached all parts of the country and is responsible for perverting the instinctive patriotism of the people to momentary support of the league covenant. After the adjournment of congress on March 4, however, various senators undertook speaking tours in the course of which they told their audiences just what malign influences were hidden behind the "permanent peace" arguments of the league supporters. Their addresses and the debates in congress have done much to offset the work of Mr. Taft's organization, and it now seems certain that a far greater number of the American people oppose the league than favor it.

TRAVELING SALESMAN ALLEGED BANK ROBBER

Lee C. Carter, commercial traveling salesman, who has been a visitor in Roseburg on many of his business trips up until about a year ago, was arrested Sunday in San Francisco on a very serious charge. It is alleged that he robbed a bank in Haines, Oregon, of \$2100. He was detected when he had issued a warrant for the arrest of Miss Hazel Perry of San Francisco charging her with stealing \$1700 of his cash. It is understood that Carter has made a confession. The police say that Carter has paraded under several other names during the past year and is known as Charles Burke, Charles Connors and Patrick Murphy. It is said that he admits breaking jail in Pendleton and the sheriff of that county is almost certain he is the identical man who broke the Umatilla county jail on May 24.

FARMERS MUST MAKE REPORT ON CROPS

The recent legislature passed a law requiring all persons owning or operating farms to report to the county assessor, in detail, the number of acres of land devoted to a commercial way, to the growth or culture of agricultural or horticultural products of all kinds. The proper blanks did not arrive in time to be given to all field deputies and today Assessor Gordon is mailing out cards which will be filled out by the operators of farms giving the number of acres devoted to the various crops being raised. When returns have been made the assessor will have record of the entire county and will be able to state exactly the total number of acres planned to any certain crop, the total number of acres of land under cultivation, the number of bearing trees, the number of non-bearing trees and other valuable information concerning the county.

FORMER HOTEL MAN DIES LAST FRIDAY

Funeral services for George E. Good, a former Roseburg resident, were held Sunday afternoon at the Portland crematorium. Mr. Good died at Walla Walla Friday after an illness of two months. He was 56 years of age and "lived his life in the hotel business." His wife, Mrs. Good, is in Walla Walla. He was proprietor of the Mettalian hotel in this city about 16 years ago. He is well known here and his many friends regret to hear of his sudden demise.
