The proposition of the measure now under consideration by congress to take over the packing industry and run the business under government control is not looked upon with any favor by the multitude who are clamoring for dropping living expenses. Federal administration of railroads is pointed to as a good criterion to go by. If the government could not run the railroads economically and save the public a little money, why should it be expected that any better results would be attained in the packing industry. Under present private control of the packing plants the farmer and stockman are getting, according to figures obtainable, 85 per cent of the value of a steer. Twelve and ninety-six hundredths per cent goes to expenses in handling, freight, labor, etc., and the company gets 2.04 per cent profit. If the government could give positive assurances of beating this record it might do to talk about the matter, but past experience would indicate that under federal management the consumer would pay more while the producer would get less.

GUARDIAN GUILTY OF ASSAULT AND BATTERY

C. G. Voorhies, guardian of Dana Messenger, the feeble minded girl, who was picked up by the authorities following her departure from her foster parents, was arrested yesterday evening on a charge of assault and battery, to which he entered a plea of guilty in the juvenile court. Voorhies whipped the girl, who is 24 years old, inflicting a number of bruises on her body. When placed under arrest he broke down and pleaded for leniency. As he has no funds, he was not fined but was given a good lecture by Judge Marsters, who used perfectly understandable English in telling the man just what he could expect in the event he attempted any other such act. Voorhies was also informed that his presence in the county was not needed and he left this afternoon for Corvallis. The girl will be given an examination and will probably be committed to the State school for feeble minded, or to some other charitable institution. County Judge Marsters phoned to Judge Wade of Coos County this morning, and the latter offered to pay all expenses in connection with the case and to concur in any action taken by the Douglas County officials.

RAMPS ARE ARRESTED FOR KILLING DOE

The Gold Beach Reporter has the following to say concerning a former resident—Game Warden Adams broke the Sabbath by arresting a party consisting of Wes Hill, "Butch" Ramp, his father, A. Ramp, of Salem, and also a younger Ramp, for having in their possession the carcass of a doe. The elder Ramp, being an old soldier, the charge against him was dismissed while the younger Ramp was also let off with an admonition, but Hill and "Butch" Ramp were arrested before Justice Doe and given the limit in fines, \$200 and costs. With the exception of \$25, however, the fine was suspended pending good behavior.
