SENATES FIRM STAND BALKED UNWORTHY ACT

The administration is once more pressing for the ratification of the treaty with Columbia. Acting Secretary of State Polk recently conferred with Senator Lodge, chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, and urged that the treaty be promptly ratified.

Consideration of this treaty recalls the fact that for years the administration sought to force it through the Senate with a provision included which offered apology to Columbia for developments in connection with the acquisition of the Panama Canal Zone by the United States. Senate Republicans took a firm stand against any such policy and against putting the United States in the attitude of truckling to Columbia. They felt that such a thing was unworthy of this government and furthermore that the apology was designed to reflect on the administration of Theodore Roosevelt. As a result of the stand this taken the treaty has been so modified as to cut out the apology. —National Republican.
