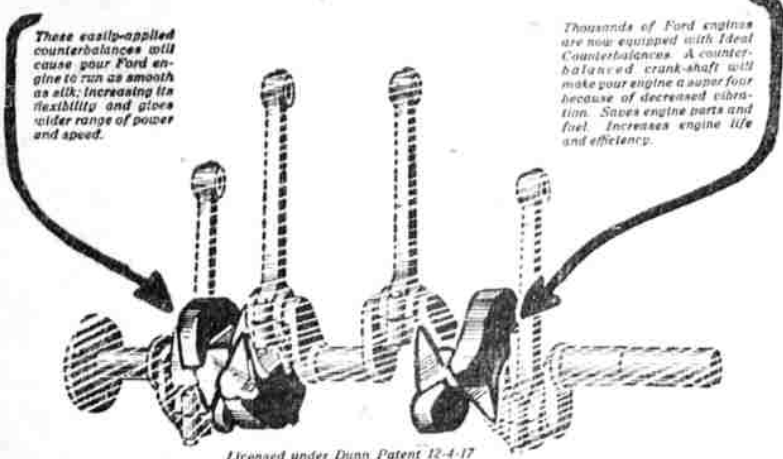

Riddle Starts Cut-off Fight

The members of the state highway commission and adopting the present location of the road as permanent. This resolution was disregarded by the commission which ordered plans prepared, called for bids and awarded the contract for improvement to H. J. Hildebrand, for the sum of \$36,290.

No Right-of-Way

The complaint sets forth that the county must provide the right-of-way and that it has not as yet purchased the land needed. It has expended the funds at its command and without exceeding its constitutional limitation of indebtedness will be unable to obtain sufficient money to buy the right-of-way. Also it has adopted the present route and has gone on record as opposing any change. The plaintiff further alleges that the new road is a duplicate of the road now in use and will be of no benefit. The present highways, it is claimed, penetrate the farming communities of the district and that the new location will be only an added burden and expense. It is also set forth that a new bridge will be necessary at a large expense to the taxpayers with no returns. The two roads now in use must be maintained and the construction and improvement of the proposed highway will be an added source of expense to all taxpayers of the county and state. It is also claimed that the state commission has power to purchase rights of way for new locations.

Commission Enjoined.

The plaintiff asks that the court

enjoin the highway commission and county court from changing or attempting to change the route of the Pacific highway through Riddle and also from procuring any rights-of-way along the proposed line, also that the contract be declared illegal and void and that the secretary of state and state treasurer be enjoined from issuing vouchers and warrants for work on the new location.

The plaintiff is endeavoring to hasten the case through the courts and the sheriff has been requested to complete the service as quickly as possible as it is quite certain that a hearing will be held soon before Judge Hamilton and that the matter will be carried to the supreme court by either side.

Ships Cattle and Grain.

Postal Relations Resumed.
