The funeral of Mrs. A. Salzman was held from the Baptist church this afternoon on account of the stormy weather and was attended by a large concourse of people, testifying to the high esteem in which the deceased was held in the community and expressing their sincere sympathy to the stricken husband and other relatives. Several fraternal orders were in attendance and a number of business houses were closed at the hour of the funeral.

In Justice Robinett's court today Dr. H. P. Brookhart was held in a bond of \$100 for assault with a dangerous weapon, the complaint having been made by Leo. Fritz, of Drain. The testimony showed that the doctor appeared on the street there Tuesday night at a late hour with a revolver in his hand. Being accosted by some young men, he approached and pointed the weapon at them and some words were passed between the parties, but nothing more serious occurred. Attorneys Louis Barzee and George Byron appeared for the accused today.
