HOPE IS GONE

Russians Now Believe That War is Inevitable.

NO ALTERNATIVE BUT FIGHT

British Cabinet is Called to Decide Course of That Government in the Conflict.

LONDON, Jan. 7.—Dispatches received from St. Petersburg today state the belief that there is now no hope for peace with Japan, and intimate that Russia's reply is entirely unsatisfactory to Japan, leaving the latter government no alternative but to fight. Both countries are rushing troops and war ships to Korean waters.

The British cabinet has been called for next Monday to determine what position England will take in the coming conflict. It is said that she cannot and will not allow Japan to be crushed.

This is considered by the board as a very important step toward securing the appropriation.

Gale Mystery not Solved.

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., Jan. 6.—The remains of Fred Gale, who died on the morning of January 4, from the effects of injuries received from an unknown

hand in his home during the night of December 31, was buried by the Odd Fellows Lodge in their cemetery at this place yesterday.

Thus far no definite clue has been obtained as to who the guilty person is of this dastardly deed. It is pretty well established, however that robbery was not the intent of the assailant, as none of his personal effects were missing from his room. The opinion that a woman was connected with the affair seems to be growing, as more than one person claims to have seen in his room after the hour of midnight of his assault.

BIG LAND CASE

Government Seeks to Cancel a Military Road Grant.

115,000 ACRES INVOLVED

Worth \$2,500,000—Now Being Heard in U. S. Supreme Court for the Fourth Time.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—The supreme court of the United States is hearing an argument today in the case of the United States vs. the California & Oregon Land company, appellant, from the United States court of the district of Oregon.

The case involves 115,000 acres of land in the Klamath Indian Reservation and granted 30 years ago to the state of Oregon to aid in the construction of a military wagon road from Eugene city across the Cascade mountains to the eastern boundary of the state. The government now seeks to cancel the grant, thus depriving purchasers from the state of their rights acquired.

(The purchasers were the Oregon Military Wagon Road Co., and the present owners of this land are the Oregon Land & Livestock Co. The latter includes: T. R. Sheridan and J. H. Booth, of Roseburg; R. A. Booth, G. H. Kelly and J. F. Kelly, of Eugene; F. H. Buck, of Vacaville, Calif.; A. J. Hechtman and Herbert Fleishner, of San Francisco, and A. J. Hellbrom and Frank Miller, of Sacramento. The grant was made by congress to the state of Oregon in 1864, and by the state to the road company in 1886. In the early seventies the Klamath Indian Reservation was set aside by treaty with the Indians at the close of the Modoc war. The grant was approved by the government and patented to the road company, and later, in behalf of the Indians, the government brought suit to set aside title to the land, claiming that the rights of the Indians thereto by reason of prior occupancy had never ceased. The company was offered indemnity in lieu of these lands, which it declined to accept, contending that the act of granting and patenting the lands, prior to the creation of the reservation, excepted them from subsequent disposition, and that in according to the treaty offered, the Indians recognized the sovereignty of the United States. The suit brought by the government was taken before Judge Bellinger of the United States district court at Portland and he rendered a decision in favor of the government. The road company took an appeal to the United States supreme court and that body, with its full bench of nine members, failed to reach a decision. The case was taken under advisement by the supreme court, this time with a bench of eight members, death having removed one of its number, and the decisions rendered stood four for each side. A third time the court essayed to render a verdict, still with eight members, and again the decisions resulted in a tie. Since then a ninth member has been appointed to the supreme bench and a definite decision on the case may therefore be expected as the result of the hearing now pending. The lands involved in the contest are estimated to be worth \$2,500,000.)

The increased service goes into effect next month and will give Portland a steamship every thirteen days.

CHICAGO, Jan. 6.—Fifteen railroads in the General Manager's Assn. in this city report the laying off of nearly 18,000 employees during the last three months.
