NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—Steel common is quoted at \$10.50 this morning. It is the opinion of the brokers that the dividend on the common stock, of which half a billion dollars worth of shares are held by 40,000 persons, will never be resumed. The public paid \$10 to \$50 a share. This half billion is worth about \$50,000,000. Brokers this morning offer to wager even money that the next preferred dividend will be cut.
