EPWORTH LEAGUE CONVENTION.

Chapters of the Grants Pass District
to Meet in Roseburg, May 5-8.

At the regular monthly business meeting of the local Epworth League at the M. E. church last night, an invitation was extended to all chapters of the Epworth League in the Grants Pass district to send delegates to Roseburg the first week in May, 1904, for the purpose of organizing and holding an Epworth League Convention. This convention will begin Thursday, May 5th, and end Sunday evening, May 8th. Thursday evening will be devoted to addresses of welcome and a social or entertainment for the purpose of becoming acquainted. On Friday and Saturday evenings there will be stirring addresses by the best talent in the district. Sunday will be devoted to the regular Sunday services. The morning and afternoon of Friday and Saturday will be used for the transaction of the business of the convention and to the reading and discussion of especially prepared papers by delegates. Every phase of the Epworth League work will be discussed in the convention. It is intended that the district convention shall be held once each year at one of the towns of the district. These district conventions are a great help to the Epworth League, and the Grants Pass district has long felt the need of united effort in a convention, but there seemed to be no one to start the log rolling, so the local League took the matter up and have invited the Leagues of the district to hold their first convention in Roseburg, May 5th to 8th, 1904, inclusive.

The officers of the local Epworth League are: President, C. E. Wagner; first vice-president, L. S. Hopfield; second vice-president, Mrs. A. C. Marsters; third vice-president, Frank Rogers; fourth vice-president, Jo. Boyers; Secy., Thos. Marks; Treas., Mae Fisher; Junior Supt., L. S. Hopfield.

Pendleton Banker Assigns.

PENDLETON, Or., Jan. 7.—C. B. Wade, manager of Senator Ankeny's First National Bank here, has failed. His indebtedness amounts to over \$100,000, and his assets consist of \$150,000 worth of property, against which there is thought to be mortgages and other claims. One of the trustees appointed gave out the following statement: "Mr. Wade was interested in the Goldconda mine in Sumpter, and expected to sell the property to an eastern company for \$2,000,000. He expected to make the deal two months ago, but it has not gone through yet. This would have put him out of difficulty. The bank is not affected in the least. The creditors preferred to take this action rather than have it go through the bankruptcy courts, so as to save the costs."
