A CLOSE CALL

Steamer Centennial Had a Narrow Escape.

VIGILANCE OF THE CAPTAIN

Who Remained in Personal Command For 36 Hours and Finally Saved His Ship.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 13.—Another thrilling report from the recent heavy storm along the coast is brought by the steamer Centennial, which has just arrived here. Off Cape Flattery the vessel had a fearful struggle with the raging elements and all the 70 passengers on board wore life preservers for 24 hours, during which time it was momentarily feared that the steamer could not withstand the tempest. One woman, in her fright, tried to jump overboard. The saving of the vessel is attributed largely to the efficiency of the captain, who remained constantly on the bridge for 36 hours and finally saved his ship from the impending disaster.

ARE HARD HIT

Interesting Discussion at Livestock Convention.

MARKET MEN ALSO PRESENT

Great Falling Off in Cattle Values During the Past Year—Subjects Discussed.

PORTLAND, Jan. 13.—After being much delayed by a snowstorm, the Texas delegation to the National Livestock convention finally reached here last night to join in the deliberations. The sessions today were most interesting. The day's program opened at 9:30 a. m. with music by orchestra and was followed by consideration of resolutions. At 10 a. m. began five-minute addresses from members of the executive committee on livestock conditions in their several states and territories. Short addresses were also made by representatives of the various markets in the great selling centers of the country, including Chicago, Kansas City, Omaha National Stock Yard, St. Joseph, Sioux City, Ft. Worth, Indianapolis, St. Paul, Cincinnati, Pittsburg, Denver and Portland.

ENORMOUS FALL IN PRICES.

Just before noon the annual report of Secretary Chas. F. Martin was submitted. Among other things he says the decline in the value of live stock of the nation during the past eighteen months, because of the manipulation of prices by powerful combinations in eastern market centers and other causes amounts to the enormous sum of more than \$750,000,000. This, with the other

matters mentioned have tended to somewhat discourage the stockman. These conditions, however, should be the incentive for everyone engaged in the industry to assist in devising methods to permanently rectify these evils. It is only by prompt and decisive action that justice can be obtained.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Upon reassembling at 1:30 p. m., the annual report of the executive committee was submitted. This was followed by the consideration of resolutions, and an address on "The Horse and the Horse Industry," by Hon. C. E. Stubbs, of Colorado. Another address of more than ordinary interest at this time was that of Hon. C. E. Adams, of Nebraska, upon "The Injurious Effects of a Packers' Combination Upon the Grower and Feeders of Livestock." Later this afternoon will be heard addresses on "Winter Feeding on the Range," by Col. C. E. Wantland, of Missouri; and "Our Ponies," by Hon. Mortimer L. L. Loring, of Indiana.

In his annual address yesterday Pres. Springer thoroughly grilled the railroad managers of the country for not affording better service and facilities for shippers of livestock, as this class of business is one of the greatest sources of revenue to the western roads.

The Baker Theatre, where the sessions are being held, has been literally packed with members and visitors all day.
