Death of Caius Webster.


D. S. West received a telegram Tuesday announcing the death that day of his brother-in-law, Caius Webster, at Paso Robles, Calif. Mr. Webster will be remembered by many of the older residents of Roseburg. In the early '70s he published a newspaper in this city called The Ensign, at the place now occupied by the Plainedealer, to which name the paper was changed after Mr. Webster sold out to E. G. Hersh, now a resident of San Francisco. After disposing of The Ensign, Mr. Webster moved to Marshfield and took up the practice of law. Later he formed a partnership with his cousin, A. M. Crawford, now attorney general of Oregon. Mr. Webster served one term in the Oregon legislature as joint representative of Coos and Douglas counties. A number of years ago Mr. Webster moved with his family to California and settled near Paso Robles. Of late he had been in poor health, which gradually brought on his demise.

Mr. Webster was 65 years of age. He is survived by a widow, two sons and two daughters.
