For the special benefit of the prune growers who have fruit in the Umpqua Valley Prune Association warehouse, we will say that our French prunes are all closed out and the following prices were realized:

40 to 50, 3.95 per hundred pounds.
50 to 60, 3.85 per hundred pounds.
60 to 70, 3.75 per hundred pounds.
70 to 80, 2.65 per hundred pounds.
80 to 90, 2.05 per hundred pounds.
90 to 100, 1.55 per hundred pounds.
100 and over, .98 per hundred pounds.
This shows the net price except the storage and insurance in the pool which will not very materially lessen the figures given. We are now making a distribution of what funds are on hand to the growers.

OIL WELL TO RESUME

The Umpqua Valley Oil Co. to Again Begin Doing Business.

Arrangements have been made by the officers of the Umpqua Valley Oil Co. whereby a well is to be completed to the depth of 2000 feet under a guarantee that if not completed to said depth the contract becomes void, as no money is to be paid until the contract is completed. H. J. Wilkins, superintendent of the company, is now selling stock at 10 cents per share under the guarantee that if the well is not completed to the depth of 2000 feet, or oil found at a less depth, all money paid for stock shall be refunded to the purchaser. Mr. Wilkins is meeting with great success, as on Monday afternoon in about three hours he had sold something over \$1000 worth of stock.
