NOT FOR WAR

Russia Would Settle With Japan Peaceably.

CZAR WOULD LET KOREA GO

Japan May Rule the Peninsula, But Russia Will Not Evacuate Manchuria.

LONDON, Jan. 20.—It is now announced that Russia is seeking to arrange terms of settlement with Japan, one of which is the concession of Japan's predominance over Korea, providing other powers are willing. The chances for war between the two nations are getting slimmer every day. It is understood, however, that Russia will not consider any proposition for her evacuation of Manchuria.

TO THE PEN

Two More Men Sentenced in the Circuit Court.

BICE BOY GETS TWO YEARS

Seventeen-Year-Old Horse Thief Will Probably be Oregon's Youngest Convict.

Harvey Bice, two years; stealing horses. Frank Randall, one year; grand larceny.

John Rose, one month in county jail; petty larceny.

The above are the sentences pronounced by Judge Hamilton in the circuit court this afternoon. Attorney F. F. Miceli, who was appointed counsel for Harvey Bice, the 17-year-old horse thief, made an earnest plea for the leniency of the court. He argued that the boy had been mainly influenced to commit crime by his older brother, who was on Tuesday given a sentence of six years for horse stealing, and was therefore entitled to the court's merciful consideration. Judge Hamilton expressed regret at his inability to send the boy back to the reform school because he was over 16 years of age, but he imposed upon him the minimum sentence prescribed by law—one year for each of the two indictments, making two years the boy will have to serve unless good behavior in prison secures his release sooner.

Frank Randall, who was sentenced to one year's imprisonment for grand larceny, stole money and other articles from a fellow farm hand at Myrtle Creek on the 12th day of last December, to the total value of \$56. Had the value of the articles stolen been one dollar less—\$55—the crime would have come under the legal classification of petty larceny instead of grand larceny, and instead of going to the penitentiary, Randall would have served time in the county jail.

John Rose, who will board and lodge at the county's expense for a month, took articles which did not belong to him from J. A. McDougall's residence last November. These articles totalled a value of \$12, hence he will "do time."

in jail at Roseburg. He had already been in jail 75 days awaiting trial. Both Rose and Randall plead guilty to the respective crimes with which they were charged when arraigned Tuesday afternoon, after the grand jury had returned true bills against them.

GRAND JURY HILLS.

Along with their indictments of Rose and Randall Tuesday, the grand jury returned a true bill against Joseph Bramlett, the colored individual who assaulted Brakeman Scott Lander with rocks after being ejected from a south-bound passenger train at West Fork on the 25th of last October. When arraigned Bramlett plead not guilty. His trial will probably be taken up tomorrow.

Not a true bill was returned against Shardin Croy, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon. This charge resulted from a personal encounter between Croy and Geo. E. Brown, a stage driver, at Camas Valley last October, in which Croy used a knife on Brown, cutting him in several places about the face and breast.

CIVIL CASES.

In the case of Dr. E. V. Hoover vs. D. J. Jarvis, an action to recover \$58 for professional services, the jury returned a verdict awarding the plaintiff \$40.50.

The \$5000 damage suit brought against the town of Drain by Mrs. H. A. McClaren, for injuries alleged to have been sustained by being struck by a board in a defective sidewalk and knocked down, was taken up before a jury Tuesday afternoon and this afternoon was still in progress. TWO HELD UP

J. C. Fullerton and O. J. Signalness the Victims.

SAME MAN DID BOTH JOBS

Signalness Put up a Fight and Saved His Money at Expense of His Head.

Two hold-ups occurred here early last night, the victims being Judge J. C. Fullerton and Oscar J. Signalness. Signalness was formerly a porter at the Hotel McClallen. Both men say the man who held them up was about six feet tall, of slender build, wore a grayish colored suit of clothes, and a white handkerchief over the lower part of his face, thus establishing the fact that the same man perpetrated both deeds. The highwayman's night's work netted him about \$1.50, which he secured from Judge Fullerton, his other victim, Signalness, making a fight which finally caused the thug to disappear without any booty, leaving Signalness with a painful but not serious gash on the upper left side of his head.

Judge Fullerton was held up while he was crossing the bridge that spans the river, while coming over to town from his home in West Roseburg, about 6:30 o'clock. Someone approached him from behind and ordered him to throw up his hands. Turning around, Judge Fullerton found himself looking into the barrel of a big, blued revolver, and his hands at once went heavenward. The robber searched only one of the Judge's pockets, and from this he extracted what loose silver there was and a bunch of keys. He made a motion to take the victim's watch, but a plea from its owner saved it.

Apparently not satisfied with only \$1.50 from a hold-up, the highwayman quickly made his way to North Roseburg in search of another victim. When Signalness came along, the robber was standing in front of the Love house, occupied by John Millman, a few yards north of the S. P. R. R. spur, extending into Kinney Addition. "Throw up your hands," commanded the robber, pointing a revolver at Signalness.

"I don't throw up my hands for any man," said Signalness.

"I'll shoot if you don't," warned the robber.

"You wouldn't shoot; you're too much of a coward," retorted Signalness, and then he began to call for help. The robber moved a little closer to his victim, and Signalness thinking he was going to shoot, made a successful grab at the pistol confronting him and caught the barrel of the menacing weapon. In the scuffle that ensued, the robber wrenched his weapon free from Signalness and struck him over the head with it. The robber started away, but seeing some persons approaching turned back.

When Signalness saw the robber returning he got over the fence into the Millman door yard. The highwayman passed on and disappeared in the darkness.

It is possible that this is the same man who committed the hold-ups here several weeks ago. On the former occasions the man was described as being tall and slender and by one person as smooth shaven. In the struggle between the robber and Signalness last night, the white handkerchief came off of the thug's face, revealing a smooth shaven countenance.

Sixty Persons Drowned.

BLOOMFONTEIN, South Africa, Jan. 19.—A message from the Orange River colony announced today that sixty persons were drowned by a cloudburst which occurred last Sunday and destroyed many buildings, doing great damage. Twenty-four bodies have been recovered.

OTHER DISASTERS

SEBASTAPOL, Russia, Jan. 19.—A fire in a crowded cafe here today caused a panic. Six corpses have been recovered and it is feared that a score or more are in the ruins.

CINCINNATI, Jan. 19.—The immense warehouse of the Milbich distillery was entirely destroyed by fire this morning. Two firemen were seriously injured by a falling wall. The loss amounts to \$100,000.

MARZEN, Ind., Jan. 19.—Fire this morning destroyed the five-story colonial apartment building in this city. Two hundred people narrowly escaped death, and a number were removed by firemen in an unconscious condition. The elevator operator deserted his post but the porter operated the lift, thereby saving many persons from being burned to death.
