VALLEY LEAGUE TO RESUME.

Excellent Prospects for Another Season of Good Baseball.

The prospects for another season of baseball in the Willamette Valley League are very flattering. From present indications the league will include the same cities as last year, Albany, Eugene, Salem and Roseburg, and the playing season will probably cover a period of nearly five months. The favorable sentiment of the fans in Eugene and Salem are reflected in the timely agitation of the matter in the newspapers of those towns, and here in Roseburg there is a manifest desire on part of prospective backers of a local team to perfect arrangements at an early date for another season of first-class baseball. Albany's voice in the matter has been heard only through an indirect source, but it was favorable in expression and its re-entrance into the league seems assured. Indeed, it would appear that all that is necessary now is for representatives of the four towns to get together and draw up league agreements and a schedule of games.

President Turner, of Albany, has called a meeting of league representatives for next Sunday, Jan. 24th. The meeting will be held in Albany.

One of the things which will be discussed at this meeting is the proposition advanced by Captain W. E. Morrow, of the local club of last year, whereby Roseburg, Eugene and Albany would be less likely to again finish the season with financial deficits, while Salem could boast of a comfortable cash balance in its treasury. On account of its larger population from which to draw patronage, Salem was able to carry on baseball on a profitable basis, while the other three cities went behind in endeavoring to strengthen their teams when the patronage was insufficient to defray the expenses. Mr. Morrow's proposition is to let each team pay its hotel and travelling expenses and receive fifty per cent of the gate receipts from each game, with a guarantee of the visiting team receiving no less than \$40 for each game played. A fifty per cent division of the gate receipts would not materially affect Roseburg, Eugene or Albany, for it generally cost the home team that much anyhow to pay the expenses of the visitors, but it would give those three towns a just proportion of the big gate receipts at Salem, and on special occasions elsewhere. It is understood that Salem is willing to accept this proposition.

Another matter to be taken under consideration at the meeting is the discontinuance of games on Saturday, that day being the busiest of the week, keeping the attendance down. It is argued that Monday is a better day than Saturday, so the series of each week may consist of Sunday and Monday games.

Roseburg expects to have a stronger team this year than last. The redoubtable "Pap" Morrow, the "La Jole" of the league last year, will again head the local aggregation and this fact is sufficient guarantee for a strong team.
