Tobey, at 606 Marquam Building, Portland.

Since 1895, between seven and eight hundred children have been placed, on this upper Pacific coast.

CHANCE FOR MORE TROUBLE

U. S. Asked to Establish Protectorate Over San Domingo.

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—It is reported here, says a Herald dispatch from St. Thomas, D. W. I., that the Dominican minister of foreign affairs, accompanied by a delegate, has left Santo Domingo for Washington to attempt to make arrangements with the United States to establish a protectorate over the republic of Santo Domingo.

Vigorous bombardment of the capital continues by the forces of General Jimenez. Many refugees, including several deputies, have arrived here on the French steamer from Port au Prince, Hayti.
