HOUSES OF SAND.

New Process Will Erect Mansions as Durable as Granite.
Houses built of sand, but as substantial and durable as granite, have been made possible by a process just perfected in England by Mr. L. P. Ford of Grosford.

Mr. Ford is well known in South Africa, where before the Boer war he founded Fordsburg, a suburb of Johannesburg, and also the Johannesburg waterworks and the Pretoria Electric Lighting company.

A bed of clean sand and ground quicklime are the materials needed for the new artificial rock. The ingredients are mixed in proper proportions mechanically and forced by a screw into a mold formed of a very strong steel cylinder.

After the mold is filled it is placed in a box, and the air it contains is sucked out by an air pump. Hot water is then admitted. The water rushes into every minute space and sets the particles of lime to slacking. The lime swells and causes a great pressure in the mold, while at the same time an intense heat is produced.

Under the influence of the heat and pressure the sand and lime are mold-into a rock which has 90 per cent as much strength as the hardest granite. It is ready for use in eight hours.

The rock is of the same composition as the old Roman cement, the most durable of building materials. The secret of making this Roman cement has been lost for ages.

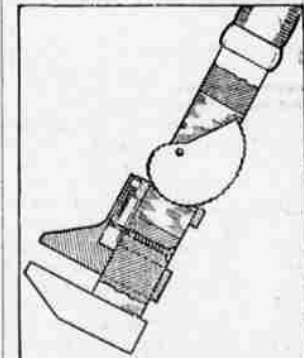
The new building stone costs but 22 cents a cubic foot. The secret of Mr. Ford's success is said to lie in his use of a cylindrical mold. Others who tried to make silicate of lime building stone used square molds. They did not get an even distribution of the internal and external strains, and the stone produced was full of cracks.

ADJUSTABLE WRENCH.

Requires No Turning of Thumb Wheel to Regulate Its Opening.

With a large share of the machinery which is used in our manufacturing industries the builders furnish special wrenches which will only fit nuts of a certain size and are intended to be used in connection with the one machine. These, of course, need no adjusting to fit the nut and are a great convenience and save time for the machinist. But there are many instances in the everyday work of the machinist where a wrench which can be rapidly set to any necessary size will prove a great advantage to the man who is handling it.

The usual form of wrench requires the turning of a thumb wheel several revolutions to vary the distance between the jaws even a quarter of an inch, and there can be no movement of the jaw without turning this screw. Here is a wrench which has the movable jaw perfectly free to slide from

closure to its widest opening, only coming to a stop whenever the cam block is set. This cam block rests in the center of the slotted handle and is so pivoted that its edge is eccentric to the pin on which it revolves.

Whether the block is tilted to step the jaw close to the fixed head or to allow it to slide freely the whole length of the opening, the cam block engages the rear of the jaw in such a manner as to afford a strong support for the movable jaw. It requires no rotation of adjusting screws, but only a simple turn of the block and a sliding movement of the loose jaw to set the wrench, which probably has quite as much expansion as the majority of light wrenches in common use.

A New Anesthetic.

At a recent meeting of the French Academy of Medicine M. Courade gave an account of a new local anesthetic. It is para-amido-benzoin ether and has been named anesthesine. It is a derivative of orthoform and is slightly soluble in water, but freely so in glycerin and in fatty bodies. It is not poisonous, which gives it a great advantage over cocaine, while its action is much less transitory than that of that drug. M. Courade has used the drug, especially in cases of patients suffering from tuberculosis or syphilis ulceration of the pharynx which rendered swallowing very painful or even impossible. After an application of anesthesine in powder they were able to swallow without pain.

Rapid Telegraphy.

The Pollak-Virag system of rapid telegraphy having shown a possibility of 40,000 words an hour over the 447 miles between Berlin and Koenigsberg, it will be put in use by the German postal service on the busy line from Berlin to Frankfurt. It is a special writing machine which, working in the usual way perforates a strip of paper which is drawn over a roller under metallic brushes with great rapidity. The interruptions of the current move the non-branes of two telephones at the receiving station, which write the message by means of a small mirror.

They found this fan and furnace system supplies a uniformity of temperature throughout the rooms and halls, and besides, it furnishes a means of thorough ventilation unobtainable by any gravity system. It is also guaranteed to be very economical in the use of fuel, the saving in this way so they were informed, more than paying for the power necessary to drive the fan for forcing the warm air through the building.
