FOR CLEANING ASPHALT.

New Machine Proves Its Value In Tests In New York.

Tests have just been made by Chief Engineer Stearns of the New York city street cleaning department of an ingenious device for cleaning asphalt pavements.

The machine bore a striking resemblance to the upper part of a fallow locomotive loaded on a wagon with the cab forward and was a source of great interest to pedestrians and the throng in carriages. Drivers and chauffeurs could not help observing that the asphalt after the big vehicle had passed was remarkably clean and free from the slime which renders the pavement dangerous in moderately damp weather.

The machine tested was hastily built for the purpose and was mounted upon a heavy four wheeled truck, drawn by horses, but the perfected device will be propelled by the same gasoline motor that is employed to compress the air required to force out the water at a much higher pressure than from the ordinary sprinkler.

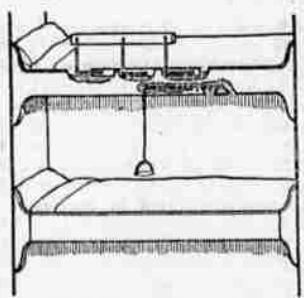
The big tank when loaded contained 1,180 gallons of water. This water was expelled from a spray a few inches from the pavement for three and a half minutes, the horses travelling with the vehicle a distance of five blocks along Fifth avenue during that time. The pressure at which the water was expelled was forty pounds to the square inch and was sufficient to clean the pavement effectively from the curb on one side to within about a third of the width of the street from the opposite curb. One trip up the avenue and another down effectively swept into the sewer openings every vestige of dirt.

Mr. Stearns said that careful tests of hose flushing by hand, the method now in use, showed that 150 cubic feet of water were used, and the best time made was nine minutes, the discharge being from an inch nozzle at a pressure of twenty pounds. The auto pneumatic flushing wagon, therefore, saved for each block cleaned ninety-two cubic feet, or 674 gallons, of water, and performed the work in less than one-seventh of the time. Besides, Mr. Stearns said, the street was much cleaner after the passage of the wagon than it could be made by hose flushing with only hydrant pressure.

FOR THE SLEEPY TRAVELER

Aids to Getting Into Upper Berths and Staying There.

The unfortunate traveler who has to sleep in the upper berth of a sleeping car or steamboat stateroom would have a troublesome time getting into it but for the little stepadders which the transportation company provides. It is to do away with this ladder and at the same time provide a rail which shall serve the double purpose of assisting the traveler into his bunk and



STIRRUP AND SIDE BAR ON BUNK, preventing his falling out after going to sleep, that this berth attachment has been designed.

As a glance at the drawing will show, there is a pivoted bar, which has a stirrup at the end, in which the foot can be inserted for climbing to the upper berth. The lowering of this stirrup into a vertical position throws up a horizontal bar along the outer edge of the berth, thus affording further assistance to the climber. When not in use both these devices can be folded into the side bar of the bunk, though at night they should be allowed to remain extended to insure the sleeper against accidental rolling off his high bed.

Germ of Smallpox Discovered.

Dr. Ludwig Heiktoen of the University of Chicago has announced a general conclusion that the physical causes of hydrophobia, vaccinia, smallpox and yellow fever are not toxic or from inherent poison, but are infectious. These transmissible diseases, says the doctor, are caused by minute living organisms capable of proliferation, bacteria so small that they work their way through the best made filters of the laboratories and so minute that they cannot be detected by the strongest microscope in existence.

Eucalyptus as Substitute For Coal.

When the world's supply of coal is exhausted, which is not a matter of immediate worry, the eucalyptus tree may be grown as a substitute. This eucalyptus stores up more of the sun's energy than any other tree (1 per cent of that received on the unit of area), and in South Africa it has been found cheaper to raise it than to import coal. An acre of eucalyptus plantation will produce each year the equivalent of thirty tons of coal.

To Harness the Platte.

Work has begun at Fremont, Neb., on the survey for a gigantic power canal scheme which will harness the waters of the Platte and furnish an enormous amount of power for the owners, which will, it is promised, be distributed throughout that section. It is known that the Armour Packing company is behind this enterprise and was found in it a place to invest its surplus capital.
