OREGON LAND

A Heavy Business Transacted Last Year.

IN THE U. S. LAND OFFICE

Larger Than Any Other State in the Union, Washington Being Second.

In the appendix of the annual report of Land Commissioner Richards, it was shown that there was nearly four times as many timber entries filed in Oregon during the fiscal year ended June 30th last, as were filed during the previous twelve months. Last year, as in the year preceding, there were more timber entries recorded in the Roseburg land office than elsewhere in Oregon. In the fiscal year 1902, there were 461 timber entries in Roseburg district, embracing 71,457 acres. From these sales the government derived \$178,044. During the past year Roseburg district reported 1700 timber entries, embracing 261,533 acres.

The Lakeview district stands next to Roseburg in the importance of its timber land business. Where this office in 1902 reported only 80 timber entries, covering 11,197 acres, it reports for the last year 950 timber entries, embracing 143,452 acres. Its receipts on account of the increased timber business show an advance from \$27,002 to \$358,631. In its importance of the timber land entries the LaGrande district ranks third. In 1902 there were only 116 timber entries filed in that office, embracing 14,456 acres. Last year there were 815 entries, covering 124,209 acres.

On account of this increase in business there has been an advance in receipts at LaGrande from \$36,141 to \$310,750.

The other U. S. land offices in the

state also show large gains over the previous year.

Summing up, it is found that where there were only 939 timber entries in Oregon in 1902, embracing a total area of 136,632 acres, there were in the past year 4200 entries, covering 645,578 acres. The total receipts from the sale of Oregon timber land show an increase from \$341,581 to \$1,613,948. In the fiscal year 1902 Oregon derived nearly \$50,000 more from the sales of its timber lands than did any other western state, Washington being second. Last year Oregon's receipts from timber lands were nearly \$903,000 more than the receipts of any other state. Again, Washington stood second, with sales amounting to \$754,013.—Oregon Timberman.

Prunes For St. Louis Fair.

Bruce Cunningham, chairman of the special committee of the Northwest Fruitgrowers' Association, has issued a circular letter to the prunegrowers in Oregon, asking for donations of prunes of the 40-50-to-the-pound size for use in advertising Oregon prunes at the St. Louis Exposition. The circular recites the beneficial results to be gained by demonstrating to Eastern people the value of the Oregon prune as an article of food when properly cooked, and says that ten carloads will be required. Local receiving agents will be appointed to solicit donations of prunes. The fruit thus gathered will be brought to a central point and shipped to St. Louis not later than March 1. The fruit will be carried to St. Louis by the railroad companies free of charge. Growers who have already sold their prunes are invited to make donations of cash.

RICH STRIKE

Wonderful Placer Discovery on Sixes River.

AVERAGES \$20.00 PER YARD

Some of the Gravel Yields as High as \$4.00 to the Pan—Developments.

ECKLEY, Oregon, Jan. 29.—A wonderfully rich strike of placer gold has just been made in the Sixes River district, Curry county. The Sixes Mining Co. recently completed a small hydraulic plant on their property and had only piped four days when they struck gravel that would yield \$4.00 in gold per pan, thus rivaling the famous Klondike discoveries of a few years ago. The entire bank about 20 feet high was then carefully prospected and was found to contain gold enough to yield \$20 per cubic yard of gravel. This same locality was worked to a very small extent in the early '50s, and was abandoned within a few feet of this wonderful deposit of untold wealth now just discovered.

The South Sixes Mining Co. is composed of the Harrison Bros. and Mr. Benson, of Myrtle Point. Harrison Bros. are old-time prospectors in this vicinity.

Plans for extensive development work have been adopted and operations are now under way. The Commander Mining Co. has property adjoining the new strike and the two companies will build a dam to raise the water 55 feet from the present stream, and from thence the water will be carried about two miles in a large flume to the mines. This will give a pressure of 250 feet and supply plenty of water to operate the two properties day and night. Excellent results are expected and will doubtless be realized.

Chicago's Fear of Fire.

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—Fire occurred in the building adjoining the Masonic Temple this morning, the result of an explosion of chemicals. Miss Mary Varva, a young woman, was fatally hurt. Chemist Rudolph was seriously and several others slightly injured. The flames gutted the fifth and sixth floors, occupied by the Gas Mantle factory. Thirty thousand dollars will be the damage.

The sensitiveness of Chicagoans to fire was again demonstrated when thousands blocked the streets, making them impassable. Police efforts to clear the streets were futile.

The continued outbreaking of fire in this district seems a strange fatality. The firequels are still fresh in the memory of all, and the breaking out of a fire causes the people to become greatly excited and beyond the control of the police, while prior to the late disaster a fire alarm would attract only casual notice, now the whole populace rushes out in an uncontrollable mass.

Every precaution is being taken in all of the large buildings to prevent fire, but they seem to burn in spite of this. Every alarm of fire brings fear to persons in every section of this big city.

THE SUPREME COURT

Oregon's Highest Tribunal Nearly Up With Its Cases.

SALEM, Or. Jan. 28.—The supreme court has about caught up with all the business demanding its attention at this time, and unless there is a flood of appeal litigation coming soon, the decks will be entirely clear in a short time. There are now 14 cases in the hands of the court, arguments in which have been submitted, and these will doubtless be decided in a few weeks. In addition to these cases there are five cases now on the calendar to be argued within the next two weeks, including those set for hearing last evening, and there are 12 cases on the bar docket ready to be set for hearing as soon as the attorneys are prepared to have the dates for the hearing fixed. This is quite a contrast to the state of Washington, where the supreme court had 119 cases ready for trial on January 1, as soon as the court could give them attention. Such a state of affairs will probably not exist in Oregon for a long time. A few years ago, however, things were different. For years the Oregon supreme court was from 200 to 250 cases behind, and it took from two to two and one-half years for a case to come up for final hearing and disposition after the appeal was taken. This was not speedy justice, but the court could not help the blockade. Efforts were several times made to give relief by legislation in the way of a supreme court commission to hear cases, but it always failed. Finally the legislature provided for stenographers for each of the justices and with the aid of these the court soon disposed of the accumulation of business. Prior to that time many of the decisions were written out by the court in long hand.

The present justices of the court, Hons. F. A. Moore, R. S. Bean and C. E. Wolverton, are hard workers and probably put in more hours of work every day than do any other like officials on the Pacific coast.
