Glendale News.

Mrs. Cecil Van Gilder is very sick this week. Her sister, Miss Minnie Selig, of Myrtle Creek, is here waiting upon her.

A very promising quartz ledge, located near West Fork, in the Cow Creek Canyon district, is being opened by the Gold Mountain Mining & Smelting Company, a recent Douglas county incorporation. This company has five claims in the Canyon district, and there are several men employed developing. The main ledge, which is the objective point for the present development, has a width of from six to eight feet, with surface values of from \$4 to \$26 a ton. The vein is a white quartz, and can be traced by surface croppings along Cow Creek for a distance of 4000 feet.

Although a number of men from Glendale, West Fork, Riddle and Roseburg have continued the search for A. N. Drake of Dads creek, who was lost in the mountains, nine miles west of Glendale, on Jan. 18, not the least trace of him has yet been found. Nearly all of the snow in that region has disappeared, which has given the searchers some hope of finding the body or trace of the missing man. Several hundred yards from his home his gloves were found in the fork of a small tree beside the trail, which no doubt he found he would not need on his hunting trip, and expected to get them when he returned. Being a new settler, Mr. Drake was not familiar with the mountains beyond a limited distance from his home, and we understand that last summer he was lost two different times while hunting in the mountains near his home, but was found each time the following night by his neighbor, B. W. S. Falk. It is said that Mr. Drake had been afflicted for a number of years with heart trouble, and he may have died suddenly from this cause in some secluded spot and the body may never be found.

About five years ago an old man named Blynn was lost in a similar manner in the mountains at the head of Bear creek, about ten miles north of Glendale, and the body never was found.—News.

New Gun Invention.

E. E. Redfield, of Glendale, has invented and constructed a new magazine gun which is a novelty and one of the neatest and best arrangements in that line that has ever been made. The invention is more particularly for rifles of small calibre, and the one he has made is a .22, with room in the magazine for about a dozen short cartridges or about ten long. The gun has a pistol grip with skeleton stock. The shells are loaded near the muzzle end of the magazine, and are pressed to the breech by a spring, as in the ordinary magazine gun. One noteworthy feature of this gun is that it will work with any length of 22-caliber cartridges. A repeater to shoot cartridges of various lengths has been unknown hitherto. The shells of different lengths may be mixed in the magazine at will, and each will come up properly in its turn. There is an automatic cut-off in the magazine, which lets only one shell out at a time. When the shell comes out
