"The Philippines for the Filipinos,"

After years of struggle and agitation,
 Tom Johnson has secured the passage
 of an ordinance in Cleveland fixing the
 price of street car fare at three cents
 within certain prescribed limits in
 which five cents had been previously
 charged. The trust-packed courts of
 Ohio have just granted an injunction
 restraining the city from reducing
 fares, on the plea of the street car com-
 panies that such an act would be "tak-
 ing money without due process of law."
 The street car syndicate has been tak-
 ing something for nothing from the
 people of Cleveland for years, in col-
 lecting five cent fares and now take
 refuge in the courts when the people
 ask for justice. Tom Johnson has made
 this long fight for cheaper fares in the
 direct interest of the thousands of
 school children who live in the suburbs
 and must either walk from one to four
 miles to and from school each day, or
 pay the exorbitant fares. He educated
 public sentiment up to a point where
 the city council of Cleveland passed the
 ordinance to the relief of the poor peo-
 ple in the outlying districts, and now
 the courts of the state balk the process
 of justice by defeating the aim of the
 city. Patriots have several years' work
 ahead in Ohio yet.—Ex.
