BIG BATTLE TODAY

Fierce Land Engagement Between the Japanese and Russians at Yalu River--Each Has Fifty Thousand Men.

PORT ARTHUR HAS BEEN CAPTURED BY THE JAPANESE

LONDON, Feb. 13, 7:30 p. m.—Dispatches received here this evening from Che Foo and Tien Tsin both state that a fierce battle was fought today by the Russians and Japanese near Wiju, on the Yalu river. About one hundred thousand men were involved in the engagement, the opposing forces being nearly equal in number. While these reports are unofficial, the naval authorities here give them credence. It has been known for several days that both the Russians and Japs have been concentrating big armies near the Yalu river. The result of this battle is not yet known.

PORT ARTHUR CAPTURED.

The dispatch from Tien Tsin, in addition to the foregoing, says that Port Arthur was captured by the Japanese yesterday. This report of the taking of this very important Russian stronghold was at first doubted here, but belief in its authenticity is now

much strengthened by the fact that Admiral Alexiff has admitted, in an official dispatch to St. Petersburg this morning, that another war vessel was sunk at Port Arthur yesterday, and other casualties occurred.

RUSSIANS ARE "RATTLED."

The Russian forces at Port Arthur lost their self control under the continued fierce onslaughts of the Japanese and sunk one of their own vessels, the transport Yenisel, by striking one of their own mines in the harbor. They also lost 95 men by this unguarded action. The British steamer Fuping is also reported as having been mistakenly fired upon. Only 4 Japs were killed and 5 wounded in the Port Arthur naval battle and their vessels received but slight damage.

RAISING WAR FUND.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 12.—The Japanese residents in this city held a rousing meeting last night at the Imperial Hotel, 606 Stockton street, and decided

to undertake the work of raising a war fund of \$5,000,000 for the assistance of their country in the fight against Russia. Consul Uyeno presided at the meeting, and he was elected to take permanent charge of the work, appoint committees and superintend the transfer to the home country.

About 200 of the most prominent residents of the local Japanese colony attended the meeting. Many patriotic speeches were made, and the general sentiment was that if the Japanese are not needed for actual fighting they should contribute everything they possess if necessary. San Francisco is expected to begin the work by the early raising of from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000, the Japanese in every California city, in Arizona, Nevada, New Mexico, Colorado, Utah, and the movement will be extended to the eastern states, where there are many very wealthy Japanese, and to Mexico and British Columbia.

MANY LIVES WERE LOST.

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—About 200 of the Varlag's crew lost their lives when the vessel was destroyed Monday by the Japanese off Chemulpo, according to a World's dispatch from Tokio. The crew of the Russian cruiser numbered 570. Many lost their lives under fire, but a large number were drowned in attempting to escape.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—The senate public lands committee has reported a bill to settle the account between the United States and the public land of different states relative to a disposition of all public lands and an allowance of 5 per cent on sales for school purposes. Under the provisions of this bill Oregon is entitled to \$80,000.

SEEK RELIEF

California Cattlemen Want to Come to Oregon.

DROUGHT MAKING INROADS

They are Powerless to Overcome—Gov. Chamberlain Has Been Appealed to.

According to dispatches received at the state's executive department yesterday hundreds of cattle quarantined in the northern part of California on account of an infection, are starving by reason of the drought in that section, and an appeal is made to Governor Chamberlain to permit of these cattle, such as are not known or believed to be infested with diseases, to be shipped into this state in order that they may subsist, says Friday's Salem Statesman.

Governor Chamberlain yesterday received a dispatch from Governor Pardee of California, setting forth the extreme conditions with which the stock is confronted and asking him if, upon a certificate from the Federal authorities, he would allow some of these suffering animals into the state. Late last evening the Governor's office was in receipt of a telegram from Secretary James Wilson, of the Department of Agriculture, the text of which follows:

"It is represented by the governor of California that the cattle in the quarantined section are starving on account of drought. He desires that permission be granted to ship some of these cattle into your state. This department would inspect and do everything possible to exclude infected animals, but could not guarantee freedom from infection without dipping. It would be necessary for the proper officers of your state to keep such animals under supervision and prevent their leaving your state for 90 days after arrival. Are you willing to receive them? Please wire answer."

Since receiving the dispatch from Governor Pardee yesterday, Governor Chamberlain, who is now in Portland, and to whom the dispatch from Secretary Wilson was forwarded last night, has had the matter under serious consideration and has not as yet determined what he will do in the premises or as to whether he is empowered under the law to extend to the state of California the relief prayed for.

Will Not Admit Cattle.

PORTLAND, Feb. 12.—It is extremely unlikely that cattle from southern California will be permitted to enter Oregon. Owing to the fact that many of them are infected with a tick which has proved fatal to cattle on Oregon ranches, it is unsafe to admit them without strict quarantine and this involves an expense which the state is not prepared to meet. The secretary of agriculture has advised Governor Chamberlain that it will be necessary for all cattle coming into the state from California to be dipped, and kept under supervision for 90 days.

"I do not see how these requirements can be complied with," said the governor this morning. "If the government was willing to pay the cost of dipping the cattle in quarantine, it

The following communication has been addressed by Governor Chamberlain to Governor Pardee of California, in reply to the latter's request for the admission of cattle from his state: "Governor George C. Pardee, Sacramento, Cal.—Dear Sir—I received your telegram of the 10th inst. announcing to me that drought in southern California threatened many cattle, and asking if this state would admit your clean cattle under federal supervision, and in answer thereto I have this day wired you as follows:

"We cannot consent to admission of southern California cattle to Oregon, unless they pass muster of strict state quarantine regulations. Our ranges are crowded and many stockmen are feeding cattle now. Fears of Texas fever and other diseases prevent compliance with your request." I now confirm this telegram."

STILL LIVING

Senator Hanna's Condition Is Very Critical.

CRISIS NOT YET REACHED

A Terrific Storm is Raging Along Puget Sound and Washington Coast.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Senator Hanna is still alive but his condition continues very critical. He passed a fairly comfortable night after the collapse of yesterday. Today's noon bulletin says: Temperature 105, pulse 120. He takes nourishment well. The crisis in the disease is not yet passed and another chill will certainly prove fatal.

STORM ON THE SOUND.

PORTLAND, Feb. 13.—The worst storm in the history of Puget Sound, is raging there today. At Seattle the wind is blowing 45 miles per hour. The storm is also fierce along the Washington and Northern Oregon coasts. Communication with several points has been cut off for two days.

Death of Simon Aaron

Simon Caro last night received a letter informing him of the death of his uncle, Simon Aaron, at North Yakima, Wash., on the 27th of last January, at the age of 90 years. The remains were taken to San Francisco and interred beside his deceased wife, who died eighteen years ago. Mr. Aaron formerly resided in Roseburg with Mr. Caro, and was familiarly known to his many friends and acquaintances as "Uncle." He was a native of Kohnar, Prussia. In 1856 he established himself in the general merchandise business at Yreka, Calif., and later opened a branch store at Cottonwood. Several years later he sold out his business and re-established himself at Tombstone, Arizona. From there he moved to Helena, Montana, where he unfortunately made business speculations that deprived him of nearly all of the means which he had accumulated during his previously successful career. He came to Roseburg eleven years ago and after a residence about four years moved to North Yakima and made his home with his two daughters, who survive him. Mr. Aaron is also survived by a son in San Francisco, and quite a number of other relatives.
