County Convention Called.

A democratic convention for the county of Douglas is hereby called to meet at Roseburg, Oregon, on Saturday, the 19th day of April, 1904, at 10 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of nominating candidates for the various county offices and electing delegates to the state convention to be held at Portland, Oregon, on the 19th day of April, 1904, and for the transaction of such other business as may come before the convention.

The several precincts in the county will be entitled to one delegate at large and one delegate for each 20 votes cast for Hon. Geo. E. Chamberlain, democratic candidate for governor in June, 1902, and one delegate to each fraction of 10 or over so cast to-wit: Bohemia, 1; Camas Valley, 3; Pordue, 2; Comstock, 4; Kellogg, 2; Gardiner, 5; Scottsburg, 2; Mt. Scott, 2; Coles Valley, 3; Cow Creek, 3; Looking Glass, 4; East Umpqua, 3; Calapoola, 6; Oakland, 5; Elkton, 3; Millwood, 2; Wilbur, 4; Civil Bend, 3; Olalla, 3; Glendale, 6; Myrtle Creek, 7; Pass Creek, 7; Hiddle, 4; Canyonville, 4; Yoncalla, 6; West Roseburg, 9; Umpqua, 6; Deer Creek, 6; Roseburg, 9; Days Creek, 1.

Primaries will be held in the various precincts on Saturday, the 9th day of April, 1904, at the hour of one o'clock p. m., and the precinct committeemen are requested to make all necessary arrangements for the same. It is earnestly urged that those selected delegates to the county convention attend in person.

Is Not Yet Decided.

No agreement over a rental figure for the proposed new armory has yet been reached by Messrs Chas. Thom and S. K. Sykes, and the militia committee consisting of Capt. F. B. Hamilton, Lieut. F. W. Haynes and O. Singleton. Messrs Thom and Sykes ask \$375 per annum for the armory alone, which would be built over the north half of Mr. Sykes' establishment and the saloon adjoining, these buildings being owned jointly by the two men; and Mr. Thom asks \$100 a year additional for that part of the upper story of the Taylor and Wilson block directly over the south half of Mr. Sykes' hardware establishment, and of which he is sole owner. This latter place would be used as officers' quarters and other necessary purposes. Against this total of \$475 for rent, increased by at least \$75 a year for lights and perhaps \$25 more for necessary incidentals, there is available an offset of only the annual state allowance of \$500 for expenses, leaving a debit balance of \$75. It is thought that this deficit can be made up from dances and other use of the hall during the year. However, the committee is still considering the matter and the result remains in doubt. In case the committee decides to reject the proposition, Messrs Sykes and Thom will in all probability put up the proposed addition and use it for independent business purposes.

Direct Primary Law.

EDITOR REVIEW: The voters of Douglas county have an opportunity to vote upon the adoption of a direct primary law at the next election, and under such a law the parties voting will be able to say by their ballots at the primary whom they want as candidates for the various offices, and when the ballots are collected and canvassed the man having the most votes will be the nominee of the party for that particular office. This is a new method of selecting candidates, but it is the one which will give all the voters a chance to be heard and to have their votes counted.

The republican party of Douglas county, if in no other county in the state, should be committed to this reform in the method of selecting officers.

In the republican county convention which met at Roseburg on April, 1900, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved that the republican party of Douglas county is in favor of the adoption of what is known as the primary election law whereby the people at the primaries may say by their ballots whom they want for the various offices without the dictation of self-appointed leaders and self-seeking politicians, and that the nominees of this party for the legislature, if elected, are instructed to aid in the enactment of a primary election law."

On the platform containing the foregoing plank Senator Marsters was elected to the senate. But when the bill to enact a primary law was before the senate Mr. Marsters flunked. The bill passed the house of representatives and when it got into the senate it was referred to a committee of which Marsters was chairman. It was not reported for a long time, and then only after a motion was made by a friend of the bill requiring that the committee report the bill. The bill was then reported without recommendation, and was again referred and was held up in one way and another until it became too late to get a vote on it.

As the convention which nominated Mr. Marsters directed that he support such a measure and endeavor to secure its passage it was hardly in keeping with his instructions to refuse to do so.

But the law will be before the people at the election in June and there is little doubt that it will be adopted and then, in the language of the resolution of the republican county convention of 1900, self-appointed leaders and self-seeking politicians will be out of a job.

The officers of the new company are: L. Lampert, of Minneapolis, president; D. L. Bailie, of Ferndale, treasurer, and Percy Hood, secretary. The Bailie & Davis mill is also owned by the new company. The first town election under the new municipal organization passed off very quietly, Monday. A full set of new officers were elected and they have all entered upon their duties. The total vote cast about equalled that cast a year ago, though there were a few voters who did not get out to the polls. Following is the vote:

Mayor—B. A. Hunsaker, 46; Hiram J. Gallop, 33.

Recorder—W. V. Hurst, 45; C. W. Rice, 23; C. O. White, 11.

Treasurer—H. A. Williams, 47; E. C. Jackson, 28.

Councilmen—N. Selig, 59; Willis Kramer, 58; John Hall, 48; J. S. Daniyan, 47; Oscar Gustafson, 38; J. D. Strong, 26; C. E. Bogue, 20; S. W. Bayless, 15. The four highest are seated.

The total number of votes cast was 81. It is thought the new council will lower the saloon license from \$800 to about \$450 and that another saloon may soon be opened.—Mail.

NOTICE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT.—Proposed improvement of Stephens street. Notice is hereby given that at the meeting of the common council of the City of Roseburg, Ore., held on the 7th day of March, 1904, the following resolution was adopted: Resolved that the common council of the City of Roseburg, Ore., deem it expedient and proposes to improve Stephens street, beginning at the south line of its boundary where it intersects Mosher street, thence continuing south to the extreme southern end of said Stephens street, where the same intersects Rice street in the 4th Southern Addition to Roseburg, Oregon, in the following manner, to-wit: (1) That the street be reduced longitudinally to a uniform grade to be established by the City Surveyor. (2) That the cross section of the surface be curved from the grade in the center to the edge of the gutter at each side. (3) That the sides of the street be entrenched for gutters to carry off the surface drainage, with lateral gutters at convenient discharge points. (4) That the expense of said survey and improvement be assessed upon the property owners adjacent as provided by the City Charter, upon the property especially benefitted thereby. Resolved, that the Recorder of the City of Roseburg be, and he is hereby

directed to give notice of the proposed survey and improvement of said street as provided by the City Charter. Remonstrance against the above improvement may be filed in writing with the undersigned within ten days from the date of the first publication of this notice. By order of the council, H. L.
