Mr. Armitage Replies.

MYRTLE CREEK, March 25, 1904.

EDITOR REVIEW: I wish space in your columns to answer a false fabrication headed, "Has Changed Hands," and signed, "a reader," in your issue of March 24th.

At the time of this writing the case of the town of Myrtle Creek vs. A. T. Thompson has not been dismissed, as claimed by your correspondent. Nor has Mr. Thompson been found "not guilty" as represented, neither is the new city recorder having the town books inspected, nor is he a party to the inspection, nor was it the wish or care of the retiring council and recorder whose hands the town and recorder's books went into after the election, showing the whole correspondence to be a mess of proverbs.

Now the only reason I would give time to answer correspondence of such ignorance and falsehood is to let your readers at a distance know who is the author of the malignant writing, if he is not ashamed to publish his name, so that should he or they leave this law-abiding town and go elsewhere they could be recognized and their association be shunned. Whoever "A Reader" may be, he seems to glow over the contemptible imagination that the law has been defeated through the election of the new council and that the whiskey ring gambling hell is now licensed to run rampant in our lovely little town. But they will find a surprise if any of the Sunday whiskey selling, gambling or bolsterous conduct comes under Mayor Hussaker's notice.

Of course, a man convicted of the violation of the law before the grand jury in January and fined \$100 and costs, don't like to be found guilty by the recorder's court in February of repeating the same offense against the law. He would naturally lose prestige with the better people of the town, and for a man who is in so respectable a business as to produce the following fruits: Houses of shame, poverty, skeletons of men, women and children, loss of business, loss of character, loss of friends, self-respect, curse of the soul, profanity and crime, and finally the curse and kick of the man who runs the "den," ought to be very careful of his standing and reputation amongst the people where he runs such a magnificent traffic.

We do not blame a man to try and free himself of such frequent findings of the courts, but we do blame him for deserting them, and will prosecute him when he disrespects the law; and if the new council, in whom this man seems to confide, will bring pressure to bear on the new recorder to dismiss the case in question, which they have no legal or moral right to do, thank God there is a grand jury for law-abiding citizens to appeal to and who will do their whole duty by chastising men who are so degraded as to persistently slip the laws of the state of Oregon in the face and then with their chums laugh at their fool-like cunning.

The past recorder is not alarmed as to who the "convict" of Myrtle Creek will be as far as the inspection of his last year's records for the town. Nor has he been hurt by the report of lies issued against him at Hell's corner, nor the threats that have been made against his body and life; but he is ashamed to have made associates so many years with a drunken class of men, and is now receiving the reward of an ill spent life for having been a good customer of the grog-shop and a liberal man at the barroom.

Now if "A Reader" or his friends want any further ventilation of these matters, just state your grievances in the public press like men, over your own signature, or in the courts as citizens, but do quit lying, backbiting or other cowardly bickerings, such as are unbecoming of gentlemen and not tolerated by law.

How to Wash Black Satin.

Take the white of an egg, four ounces of honey and a wineglassful of gin. Blend these ingredients thoroughly and then wash the satin with the mixture, using a rather hard little brush. Next rinse it well in cold water, leave it to drain and while still quite damp iron on the wrong side.

How to Sterilize Drinking Water.

Here is the latest recipe for sterilizing drinking water and killing off the typhoid germ: Put four drops of tincture of iodine in half a gallon of water and permit it to stand at least half an hour. By the end of that time it will be as harmless as distilled water. Many persons have not the facilities for making distilled water. Boiling it also entails a certain amount of trouble. In other cases the water is flat and unpleasant to the taste. The few drops of iodine impart practically no taste to the amount of water they sterilize, and at the same time they answer every medicinal purpose.

How to Clean Fur.

To clean fur take equal parts of salt and flour, mix and beat in the oven, taking care not to color the fur in doing so. With a clean piece of flannel rub this mixture into the fur, which must afterward be shaken and brushed till it is quite free of fur.

How to Make Marking Ink.

Dissolve separately one ounce of nitrate of silver with one ounce and a half of good washing soda. Mix the solutions and collect and wash the precipitate in a filter. While still moist rub it in up in a marble or stone mortar with three drams of tartaric acid. Add two ounces of distilled water. Mix six drams of white sugar and ten drams of powdered gum arabic, half an ounce of alcohol and enough water to make up six ounces.

How to Make Tomato Toast.

Cook together two cupsful of canned tomatoes and two small onions chopped fine for three-quarters of an hour; season with salt and pepper, add two level tablespoonfuls of butter and one-half cupful of milk. Pour over slices of toasted bread.

How to Make Invalids' Tea.

Make ten p.e an invalid with boiling milk instead of boiling water. It is much nicer and much more digestible if the milk really boils.

How to Remove Warts.

"Warts may be removed," says a celebrated physician, "by rubbing them night and morning with a moistened piece of muriate of ammonia. They soften and dwindle away, leaving no such mark as follows their disappearance with lunar caustic."

How to Extract Lemon Juice.

To extract the juice from lemons easily place them in a moderate oven for five minutes before squeezing.

How to Press Trousers.

In pressing trousers the iron should never be pressed upon the cloth of the trousers. Lay a thick, very damp cloth over them after adjusting the legs into the proper creases and press hard through the upper cloth. "Scorch" then is impossible.

How to Preserve Your Health.

Plenty of fresh air throughout the house, fruit in abundance and heavy roasts and rich desserts sparingly—these for the order of daily living from Thanksgiving to Easter will prevent spring fever and breakdown. One cause ascribed for the prevalence of pneumonia is the overheating of living and sleeping rooms.

How to Remove Onion Odor.

To sweeten jars and bottles which retain an odor of onions fill them with garden mold and leave them out of doors for two or three days. When well washed they will be fit for filling with jam or for any other use.
