For county judge, W. P. Cheshire, of Springfield, Judge H. R. Kincaid not being a candidate for re-nomination. For Sheriff Fred Fisk was unanimously renominated. For clerk, J. C. Parker, of Pleasant Hill; treasurer, J. E. Stevens, Eugene; commissioner, J. R. Hill, Junction; assessor, R. O. Brady, Creswell; school superintendent, R. E. Parker, Creswell; surveyor, Ralph Hunt, Eugene; coroner, H. M. Day, Eugene.

Among the resolutions adopted are: We heartily endorse the wise, economical and statesmanlike administration of Governor George E. Chamberlain.

We heartily endorse the wise, able, economical administration of J. W. Hamilton, the present judge of the second judicial district, and hereby instruct the delegates to the state and district conventions to use all honorable means to secure his nomination.

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DIED.

CLOYD.—At the home of his mother, Mrs. Julia M. Cloyd, at Edenbow, near Roseburg, Oregon, April 17, 1904, Albert S. Cloyd, aged 35 years, of pneumonia.

Two weeks ago Mr. Cloyd was taken ill with lagrippe, which suddenly developed into pneumonia, bringing death. Mr. Cloyd was employed on the McCloud River Railroad in Northern California. He was formerly a conductor on the Southern Pacific R. R., and ran out of Roseburg.

Besides his mother, Mr. Cloyd is survived by his wife and two children and the following four sisters: Mrs. A. J. Buchanan, of Portland; Mrs. Walter Hoover, Mrs. Bounds and Miss Lillie Cloyd, all of this city. He was a member of Alpha Lodge No. 47, K. of P., Table Rock Division No. 425, Order of Railway Conductors, and Umpqua Lodge No. 314, Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen. In the O. R. C., Mr. Cloyd carried a life insurance policy of \$3,000, payable in amounts of \$1,500 to his mother and wife, respectively.

The funeral was held from the Christian church in Roseburg this afternoon, with services conducted by Rev. Geo. C. Ritchey. Besides members of the orders to which the deceased belonged, there were in attendance a large number of friends of the family. Interment took place in the Odd Fellows cemetery, where services were conducted by Alpha Lodge No. 47, K. of P.

HENDRICKS.—At the family home near the fair grounds, one mile east of Roseburg, April 11, 1904, George Lawrence Hendricks, aged 36 years, 5 months and 19 days, of consumption.

Deceased was a son of Mr. and Mrs. John Hendricks, who came here from Polk county last June. Besides his parents, he is survived by two sisters and four brothers.
