AT THE HOME

Gov. Chamberlain is Spending the Day There.

TO OPEN THE NEW BARRACKS

Accommodations Are Needed For a Number of Old Soldiers Without Homes.

Gov. and Mrs. Geo. E. Chamberlain arrived here last evening from Salem and spent today at the Oregon Soldiers' Home. In addition to his regular visit of inspection, Gov. Chamberlain is taking steps toward the opening of the new barracks building completed there the past year. This building has not yet been furnished, for the reason that the legislature failed to provide means for the maintenance of any additional number of men in the home. Gov. Chamberlain says there are now several old soldiers in this state, outside of the home, who are in a needy condition, and in a few instances are being cared for in county hospitals. This should not be, and he therefore favors the opening of the new barracks at the home, just as soon as the necessary arrangements can be made, even though it will probably cause a deficit in the maintenance fund during the months yet to intervene before the convening of the next session of the legislature. Under these circumstances it is believed this action of Gov. Chamberlain will be generally commended, as it will bring relief to worthy veterans who are in need of care. There are now on file between 30 and 40 applications for admission. The opening of the new barracks will make room for these, who are now kept on the waiting list for lack of accommodations. Gov. and Mrs. Chamberlain will return to Salem tonight.

AMERICANS IN DANGER.

Japanese Will Again Try to Bottle Up Port Arthur.

Special to Evening Review. BERLIN, April 21.—The Frankfurter Zeitung today prints a dispatch from its Manchuria correspondent which reports a very bitter anti-American feeling is prevalent there. Lives of those who failed to flee before the hostilities were thoroughly under way are now in danger. Four Americans are detained at Mukden, charged with espionage on behalf of the Japanese. An Englishman arrested at Port Arthur on a charge of being a spy has been hanged. The persecution of Jews at Port Arthur is also vigorous.

WILL TRY ANOTHER CORK.

ROME, April 21.—A telegram from Chee Foo this morning states that Admiral Togo will make another attempt tonight to bottle Port Arthur with a special boat which he has prepared for sinking in the mouth of the channel.

WILL SEND BALTIC FLEET.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 21.—Admiral Skrydloff favors sending the Russian Baltic Sea fleet to the far east as soon as practicable, and this action has been fully decided upon.

Injunction Against Hill.

Special to Evening Review. TRENTON, N. J., April 21.—E. H. Harriman and other stockholders in the Northern Securities Company today obtained a writ of injunction against J. J. Hill and others restraining them from distributing the stock of the Northern Securities Company, recently dissolved by the supreme court of Minnesota, following an opinion rendered by the supreme court of the United States, holding the merger of the railroads involved to be illegal. The injunction will be in force until after the court renders a decision on a point raised by the Oregon Short Line and Union Pacific railroads, to the effect that the Northern Securities Company was only custodian of the stocks placed in pool.

IS GOOD NEWS

Southern Pacific Restores Old Lumber Rates

FROM OREGON TO BAY POINTS

The Booth-Kelly Company Will Put Logging Camps on Both Rivers at Once.

EUGENE, April 20.—Through the courtesy of Hon. R. A. Booth, of the Booth-Kelly Company, the Guard gives the people of Eugene and Lane county some very good news today. This big lumbering concern, with modern mills at Coburg, Wendling, Springfield and Saginaw, all Lane county points, capable of cutting close to 500,000 feet of lumber each twenty-four hours, is to resume logging operations immediately, and start the mills on full time, with the possible exception of Wendling, for which it is not certain cars for shipment be procured. Anyway, the Wendling plant will be started up by September.

The Coburg and Saginaw mills have never been shut down, having sixty million feet of logs on hand at the time the high rate became effective, which it was necessary to put into money, even though there was no profit in the milling.

The logging camps will be put back on the McKenzie and Willamette rivers at once, and drives started as soon as a sufficient number of logs can be banked.

The rate for dressed lumber that the railroad restores to the shippers of interior points is \$3.10 per thousand feet and \$3.17 for rough lumber, the rate superseded being \$5 per thousand feet.

Portland mills are not given the benefit of the reduced rates, as they can ship as cheaply by water, besides the railroad has only sufficient equipment to carry the products of the interior mills.

The interstate commerce law provides that before a railroad operating in two states may change rates it shall give ten days' public notice. This has been done, and at the expiration of that time the old rate will be in force.

It is a matter of congratulation that the different systems of labor necessary to the operation of this great industry will be put in employment at once. The manufacturer of the rough and finished product from the time it is taken from the tree till it is put aboard the cars for shipment requires a class of labor that commands good wages. And in a case like that of the Booth-Kelly Company with their four large mills, hundreds of men are given direct employment, while the money paid in wages is scattered among all lines of business.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., April 20.—Miss Nancy Forney Johnston, of Birmingham, Ala., who was to have been married this month to the late I. E. Avery, by a court decree granted several days ago, is permitted to assume the name of Mrs. Nancy Johnston Avery, or Mrs. Isaac Erwin Avery, as she may choose.

Through her attorneys, Miss Johnston petitioned the courts, showing that she was affianced to Avery before his death and that she desired to assume his name. The court readily granted a decree to that effect.

A bust of the late I. E. Avery, who at the time of his death was engaged in newspaper work here, will, within a very few months, be placed in the Carnegie Library in this city. Avery, though only 32 at the time of his death, was considered the most brilliant young man in the state, and by many the most brilliant young man in the South. He was consul in China in Cleveland's Administration.

Loss at Toronto.

TORONTO, April 20.—Revised estimates of the loss from the fire here place it at \$10,000,000 with \$7,000,000 insurance. One hundred and fourteen buildings were destroyed, and it is estimated that 6000 people are thrown out of employment.
