SEATTLE, April 21.—Thomas Thornton returned from Alaska after an absence of three years to find himself an Enoch Arden. His wife, thinking him dead because of his long absence, procured a divorce, married Joseph Allenby and caused the arrest of her former husband as a burglar when he entered his old home.

On Thornton's arrival from the north about April 1, with a pile of gold which he had collected in his stay on Alaskan creeks, separated far from the larger settlements, he boarded a car and hurried to his old Beacon Hill residence, where he expected to meet a glad reception and overjoy as he was received into the bosom of his family.

His wife, however, received him without enthusiasm and sprang the news of her marriage without any display of sentiment or remembrance of the love of the past.

Again he visited the place with costly presents for his children, whom he had not seen on the first visit. At that time he was met by Allenby and ordered out of the house, and soon afterward he was arrested as a burglar for an alleged entry into the home he had left. Onions From Australia.

PORTLAND, April 21.—Shipping onions to Portland from Sidney, N. S. W., is like shipping coal to Newcastle. A shipment of 35 boxes of onions arrived in port yesterday from Sidney by way of San Francisco. They were brought to California by a Pacific liner, and from there to Portland on the steamer Oregon. In appearance and strength they are very similar to other onions, and those who saw them regarded it as a rather singular event that local consumers have to send to the antipodes in order to get this kind of "fruit," particularly when they are produced in such abundance in every part of the Willamette river valley.

Those who ought to know say that it is the first time to their knowledge that an onion shipment ever came to Portland from Australia. No one appeared to know what the price of the Sidney product is and it was thought by some that this might have something to do with the matter.
