BIG RESERVES

To be Created in Eastern Oregon at Early Date.

OVER FOUR MILLION ACRES

Of Government Lands Will Thus be Withdrawn From Entry or Settlement.

WASHINGTON, May 19.—Within a few days the Bureau of Forestry will submit to Secretary Hitchcock a recommendation that four forest reserves be created in Eastern Oregon, embracing an aggregate area of 4,000,000 acres or more. These are the Blue Mountain reserve, Walla Walla reserve, Walla Walla or La Grande reserve, which extends into Washington and the Joseph River, or Chesnimus, reserve.

(We were told a year ago that if Mr. Hermann was elected to congress at that time he would prevent any more forest reserves being created in Oregon and that the withdrawals of large tracts for the Rogue river and other proposed reserves would be restored to the public domain for the benefit of settlers. Is the confidence of our people to be abused in the manner indicated above? These are matters which Mr. Hermann will be called upon to explain, if possible, to hundreds of locators and homeseekers.)

Long and Bitter Fight.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., May 20.—After a nine days' session, eight of which were spent in fruitless balloting for candidates for governor, the republican

state convention this morning adjourned until May 31, after taking the fifty-eighth ballot, resulting, Yates, 483; Lowden, 392; Deneen, 385; Hawlin, 113; Warner 53; Sherman, 46; Pierce, 29.

Reed Kept the Salemites Guessing White McInnis Was Hit Opportunely.

At Albany—Albany 13, Eugene 1. At Roseburg—Roseburg 7, Salem 1. "Happy" St. Davis, he of the dark brown hue and who wields a bat of the same complexion, drove one of the Victor Manufacturing Company's spherical products over the right-field fence at Rose Park Friday afternoon, and saved the "Raglans" from a shut-out at the hands of Morrow's warriors. Reed, who manipulated the shoots for the "Shamrocks", redeemed himself from last Saturday's game against Eugene by holding the aggregation from the Capital City down to six scattered hits. He oozed six batters, gave two passes to the first corner and made a carom on Catcher Wilkins' spine. Reed just simply had those Salemites on the run and he never let up until the last man was out. All the more credit is due Reed in view of the fact that he took his turn at the slab with an injured leg that kept him from running bases. On these occasions he was replaced by such nimble and speedy pedestrians as Chas. Bilyeu and "Pap" Morrow. Reed was given excellent support, Nadler being the only "sprig of green" on poor behavior, but his three errors proved inconsequential so far as the result of the game was concerned. Outfielder Ordway, who is nursing an injured hand, was replaced by Robinson, of last year's team. Robinson captured two difficult sky scrapers, as did his brother Eelder, Oswill. Thus the good prestige of the outfield is re-established. McInnis, who handed up the benders for the "Raglans", warmed them over the pan with plenty of speed, but at times he was erratic. He gave Newell, the first batter up, a free pass to first and put a dent in the anatomy of the next man, Catcher Oswill. A sacrifice hit by Bradley advanced them both a base. Nadler hit to Loughheed who made a poor throw to first and Nehring let it go by, allowing Newell and Oswill to score. Singles by Morrow and W. Oswill sent Nadler home. The side was then retired with an unassisted double play by Nehring. A passed ball and a fumble by Catcher Wilkins and a two-sacker by Chas. Oswill netted two more tallies in chapter 4; a single by W. Oswill, a passed ball by Wilkins and a wild throw by Fay was the cause of another tally in the fifth canto, and in the seventh a total of as many runs was completed by

Bradley's tally on Morrow's timely blingle. Roseburg made a total of nine hits off of McInnis, who was not accorded flattering support. Salem's five errors were all costly. None of these errors is charged to Second Baseman Downey, however, who played his position in brilliant style, making six assists and four put-outs.

DAILY FIGHTS

Russian and Japanese Troops Clash Frequently.

NO DECISIVE BATTLE YET.

Japanese Fail to Prevent Entrance of an Ammunition Train into Port Arthur.

Special to Evening Review. ST. PETERSBURG, May 21.—It is reported here today that the Japanese were frustrated in an attempt to prevent the passage of an ammunition train into Port Arthur. General Stoessel, commanding the garrison at Port Arthur, executed a rapid sortie and drove the Japanese back, enabling the train to reach Port Arthur in safety. The Japanese loss is placed at 1,000 men and the Russian loss at 150.

KOREANS SHOW THEIR HAND. SEOUL, May 21.—The Japanese consul at Gusan reports a clash between Russian and Korean troops at Kan Kon in which several of the former were wounded and one of the latter was killed.

JAPS RETREAT BEFORE COSSACKS. NIU CHWANG, May 20.—The stories of the Japanese retreat to Feng Wang Cheng are officially confirmed. The Japanese numbering 20,000 men, came upon 33,000 Russians in a strong position on Monday, 69 miles west of Feng Wang Cheng. It being unwise to risk a battle, the Japanese retreated in good order and with great rapidity. An unofficial Russian authority says a pitched battle was not fought, but rumor says there was considerable loss on both sides during the clashes, with the Cossacks harrying the flank of the Japanese. The pursuit was checked when the main body of the Japanese was rejoined.
