GAIN OF 181 NAMES.

Registration of Douglas County Totals
4,105 the Present Year.

The total registration of voters in Douglas county, for the June and November elections to be held this year, is 4,105, an increase of 181 over the registration in 1902. The total vote polled in this county at the election two years ago was 3897—27 less than the total number of registered voters at that time.

The registration for this year in the various precincts of Douglas county, together with the registration in 1902, showing the decrease or increase in each one, as the case may be, is given below.
