



OBITUARY OF HON. JOHN H. SHUPE.

John H. Shupe was born in Cass county, Missouri, April 26, 1850, and died at his beautiful home on Pine street, Easter morning, Sunday, April 3, 1924.

In the death of Hon. John H. Shupe our state and county has lost one of the best and truest of citizens, and our city a staunch and loyal friend. To know Mr. Shupe was to love and respect him as a true Christian gentleman. He was ever ready with encouraging words and a helping hand in every kind of worthy and good work. His friendship when won was genuine and enduring. His political career was straightforward and honest and his character unblemished. In office he served the people and was kind and obliging to all, and leaves a record above reproach. He lived to be much at home in company with his wife and children, thus proving the grandeur of his character in his loving devotion to his family. At the early age of seventeen he confessed and obeyed his Saviour; but his more active Christian life dates from soon after the organization of the first Christian Church of Roseburg, in which membership he lived till the day of his death. His Christian service was sincere and cheerful, an ever increasing joy to himself, repaid in good deeds done for others and the success of the cause he loved. He served the church as chorister from its organization constantly and faithfully and as one of its elders for several years. He has also filled many other positions in the church and its several societies. He is mourned by every member of his local church.

In 1882 Mr. Shupe's parents moved to Oregon and settled in Green Valley, on a donation land claim. On September 16, 1877, he was married to Miss Mary E. Kruse, who survives him. To this union were born five children, four daughters and one son, all of whom survive their father but Grace, who preceded him to the better world on July 14, 1901.

In 1878 he opened a variety store in Oakland and in 1881 formed a partnership with the late Dr. J. C. Shambrook and conducted a general merchandise

business under the firm name of J. H. Shupe & Co. For a number of years he served as trustee for the town of Oakland. In 1885 Mr. Shupe was elected state senator from Douglas county on the republican ticket. In 1889 he served as chief clerk of the state senate. In 1890 he moved to Roseburg where he was appointed register of the U. S. land office. In 1896 he was elected county clerk, on the republican ticket, and served one term. During the sessions of the state legislature of 1897, 1898, 1899 and 1901 he served either as chief clerk or reading clerk of the senate. Since his retirement from public life Mr. Shupe conducted a law business in this city.

The funeral was conducted at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon, April 4, 1924, at the First Christian church, which, although the largest edifice in the city, was entirely too small to vent the multitude that wished to do him honor and show sympathy for his sorrowing ones, only about half obtained entrance to the building. The floral offerings—last tribute to the honored dead—were numerous and beautiful beyond description, and banked about and upon the casket nearly covered it completely. The scripture lesson was read by Dr. J. A. Townsend, of the First Presbyterian Church, followed by prayer by Rev. Geo. C. Ritehey, pastor of the First Christian Church, after which J. N. Lester, former pastor of the church, spoke briefly, but most touchingly and lovingly, of the high Christian character and exemplary life of the dead. The remains were interred in the Masonic cemetery, the services at the grave being conducted by Revs. Lester and Ritehey. These last rites were witnessed by a large concourse of friends.

Besides the host of friends who mourn the death of Mr. Shupe there remains his wife, Mrs. Mary E. Shupe; three daughters, Mrs. Albert Abraham, Minnie W. Shupe, Ethel Shupe, and a son, Virgil Shupe, all of this city. Also a brother, P. T. Shupe, of Chicago, Ill., and a sister, Mrs. R. J. Metz, of Colfax, Washington. Many old friends and former neighbors from Oakland were in attendance at the funeral services.
