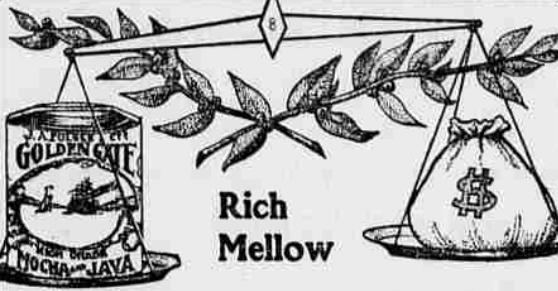

LED INTO TRAP

Russians Lose 800 Men in Fight Near Port Arthur.

JAPS FEIGNED A RETREAT.

Kuroki to be Reinforced by 20,000 Men—Attempt to Assassinate The Czar Fails.

NIK CHWANG, June 3.—It is reported here that the Russians have suffered a severe defeat as the result of being ambushed at Publication, in the rear of Port Arthur. According to the report, the Japanese first attacked the Russians and then drew the latter on by a feigned retreat. The Russians fell into the trap and are said to have lost 800 killed and wounded. The remaining body of Russians retired to Kalchow.

MORE TROOPS FOR KUROKI. SEOUL, June 13.—Twenty thousand Japanese troops were dispatched from here today to join General Kuroki.

ATTEMPT TO KILL THE CZAR. ST. PETERSBURG, June 12.—Two infernal machines were found concealed in tobacco boxes in the palace near this city, where the czar and his family reside. One of the boxes was found in the dining saloon, to which room the imperial family were shortly to enter for the evening meal, and the other in the audience chamber. The machinery in both boxes was working, and would have exploded them within half an hour.

Had the machines not been found in time it is probable that the entire palace would have been wrecked, and all its inmates killed.

With Second Baseman McKune doing the twirling, Eugene won the final game of the series with Roseburg at Rose Park Sunday. It would be hard to explain why the "Shamrocks" only made five safe hits off of his delivery, as McKune has no pretensions to being a pitcher. Besides the "Shamrocks," on Friday batted Neffger all over the lot, and Neffger has McKune distanced 20 miles in the art of slab work. The best to be said for Roseburg is that it was hard luck.

Hunter, who did the twirling for the locals, was found for ten safe bingles. Eugene made each of their four runs in the last four innings. Both sides played a poor fielding game.

Saturday's game was lost to Eugene by a bunch of ghastly errors in the first two innings and Blyeu's ascension in the ninth, when Eugene piled up six runs. Of those six runs, four were due to a home-run by Radford when the bases were full.

The absence of Bradley and White from the game during the series handicapped Roseburg. During all of three games lost, there were times when a hit would have meant victory, but it was not forthcoming because the emergency men were not equal to the occasion. In all probability, Bradley and White will be in the game during the next two series with Albany, which will be played here. With these two men again in condition, Roseburg will have an aggregation that for fast playing will be second to none in the circuit.

SALEM AND ALBANY.

Salem made it four straight from Albany Sunday, with a new pitcher named Emerson. These defeats shove Albany down in third place, while Eugene forges up next to Salem.

HIGH SCHOOL FURNITURE

Rice & Rice Awarded Contract for Desks and Chairs.

Rice & Rice, the House Furnishers, of this city, were awarded the contract for furnishing desks and chairs for the new high school at a meeting of the school directors in Roseburg last Saturday. Their bid was \$3.70 and \$3.75 apiece for the two different sizes of desks and \$3.50 per dozen for chairs. The Northwest School Furniture Company, of Portland, submitted a bid of \$3.75 and \$3.95 apiece for the desks, and agreed to furnish chairs at a lesser figure than that stipulated by Rice & Rice if awarded the contract for the desks. A bid from a Chicago firm was also opened. This firm agreed to furnish both sizes of desks at \$1.90 apiece at Chicago. As the freight expense would have raised the total price above the other figures submitted, the bid was not considered. No price on chairs was given.

Although the new high school will have a comfortable pupil-eating capa-

city of about 450, it is not the intention of the directors to install that number of desks at the beginning, as the pupils to be accommodated will probably not be over 250 during the first year. There are still on hand about 150 old desks in good condition that will be put in use in the new school.

Flower Festival.

The Christian Endeavor Society of the Presbyterian church will hold their flower festival next Friday afternoon and evening, June 17, at the rooms formerly occupied by the Board of Trade. The exhibition, however, will be open to all varieties of flowers instead of roses exclusively as formerly planned. Premiums will be awarded. d-sw-j17.
