Republicans Meet and Adjourn Till Tomorrow.

HANNA'S NAME IS CHEERED

Nothing to it but Roosevelt—Delegates Accept Invitation to Visit the World's Fair.

 CHICAGO, June 21.—The Republican National Convention was called to order at 12:14 o'clock p. m. in this city today, and at 2:13 o'clock the convention adjourned until 12 o'clock noon tomorrow. Previous to adjournment the delegates and their alternates accepted an invitation to visit the World's Fair at St. Louis after the close of the convention.

Organization was effected without unusual incident, everything passing off with cut and dried exactitude. The convention is decidedly Rooseveltian in its complexion, badges bearing the likeness of the president being in evidence galore. The mention of the name of the late Senator M. A. Hanna was greeted with a tremendous outburst of applause.

The feature of today's proceeding was the seating of two delegates each from Porto Rico and the Philippines. The temporary officers will be made permanent and the "stand pat" policy adhered to on the tariff.

BILLS UNPAID

W. E. Dewey Leaves Town, Deserting His Family.

CREDITORS LAMENT HIS ACT

Had Been Conducting the Shamrock Restaurant, Near the Depot, For a Month Past.

With outstanding debts against him aggregating about \$300, and without giving the slightest warning to anyone as to his intention, Warren E. Dewey, who with his wife, has been conducting the "Shamrock" restaurant, near the depot, in this city, suddenly left town last night and up to late this afternoon he could not be found. Before departing, Dewey sold the stock of confectionery and cigars and most of the groceries in his establishment, the proceeds of which he took along, together with the receipts of the business since last Saturday night. His wife and two little children, whom he deserted, are left practically penniless, but Mrs. Dewey has sent word to her relatives in Michigan for money, which will enable her and the children to return there.

Dewey was last seen here about 11 o'clock Monday night. After telling his wife that he would be home shortly, he stepped over to A. Mosler's restaurant, across the street from his own place of business, and after a vain effort to sell out to Mr. Mosler for various prices ranging as far down as \$25, he disappeared. The next heard of Dewey was at Winchester. From that place he phoned to Frank Brand, the night waiter at his restaurant, saying he was bound for his home in Michigan. Mrs. Dewey was nearly prostrated this morning upon discovering her husband's perfidy.

Dewey had leased the "Shamrock" restaurant for a year from M. Devaney. He had been in possession of the place for a little over a month and had not paid a cent of the contract rental. The establishment is closed pending the adjustment of matters, after which Mr. Devaney will probably reopen the business.

The local authorities have notified officers all along the line of travel to be on the lookout for Dewey.

SUSPECT CAPTURED.
 Later.—At 3:30 o'clock this afternoon Sheriff Parrott received a phone message from special Deputy T. J. Williams, at Wilbur, stating that a man answering Dewey's description had been arrested there. The man will be brought to Roseburg on the local train this evening.

Enrollment of Roseburg Schools Nearing 1,000 Mark.

FIVE DIRECTORS NEXT YEAR

J. G. Flook Succeeds S. C. Flint as Director—Annual Report of District Clerk.

According to the official report of Miss Clara Dillard, clerk of school district No. 4, which was read at the annual school-meeting Monday, the number of pupils in attendance at the Roseburg Public Schools during the school year ending this June, reached a total of 949, a gain of 81 over the enrollment for the previous year. Of this number 510 were females and 439 males. By the end of the next school year, the number of attending pupils will undoubtedly reach a total of 1,000 or over, which will place the district in what is termed the first class and, under the state law, entitling it to five directors, instead of only three as at present.

At the meeting held Monday, J. G. Flook was unanimously elected director for the regular term of three years to succeed Mr. S. C. Flint, whose term had expired and who declined re-election. Miss Dillard was re-elected clerk for another year.

The present board of directors now consists of Messrs Flook, F. W. Woolley and B. W. Strong. Mr. Woolley's term expires next June, at which time his successor and two new directors will be chosen. Mr. Strong has yet two years to serve.

The report also showed that fifteen teachers had been employed during the year, of which eight held state diplomas and seven first grade certificates. The item of insurance mentioned in the above report refers to the old school building. Insurance has also been taken out on the new high school building, but the policies were not delivered to the clerk in time for embodiment in her report.
